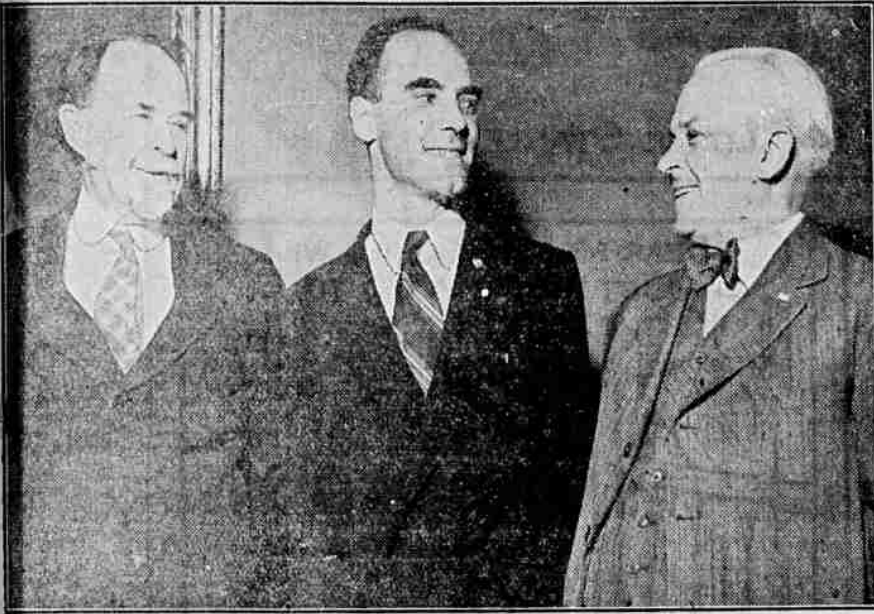


FORMER NOBEL PRIZE WINNERS GREET NEW RECIPIENT

STATESMAN'S DAUGHTER DANCES



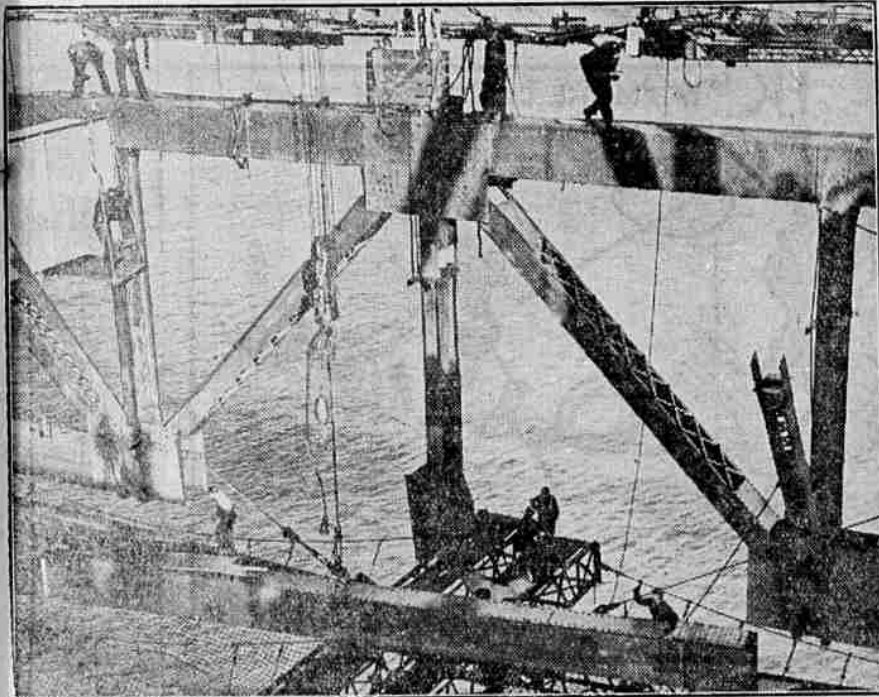

STEEL LINKS COMPLETED OVER GOLDEN GATE



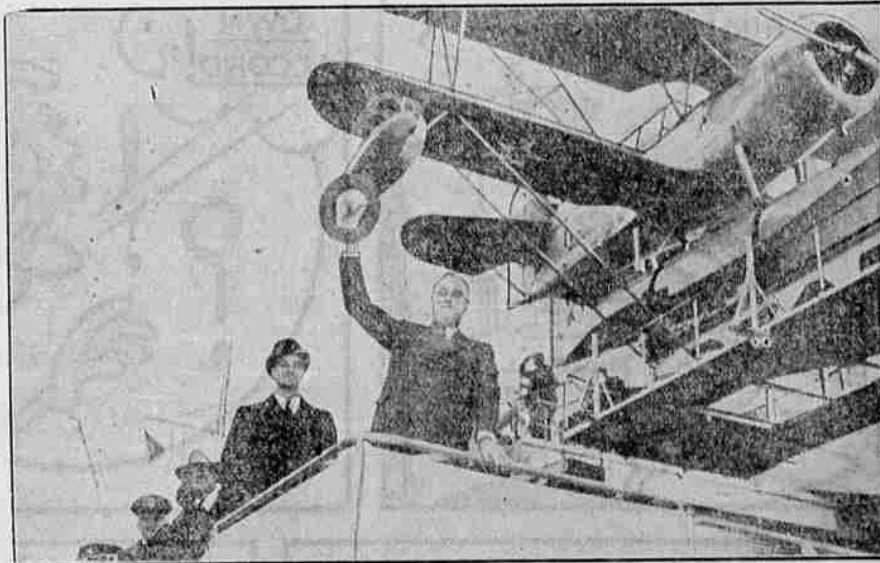

'Highgrading' Charged



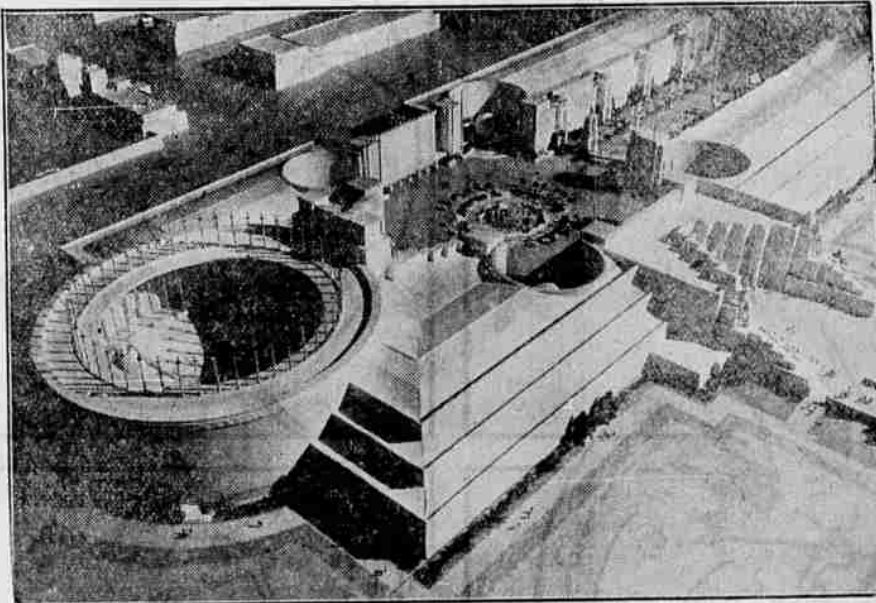

PREVIEW OF THE 1939 SAN FRANCISCO EXPEDITION



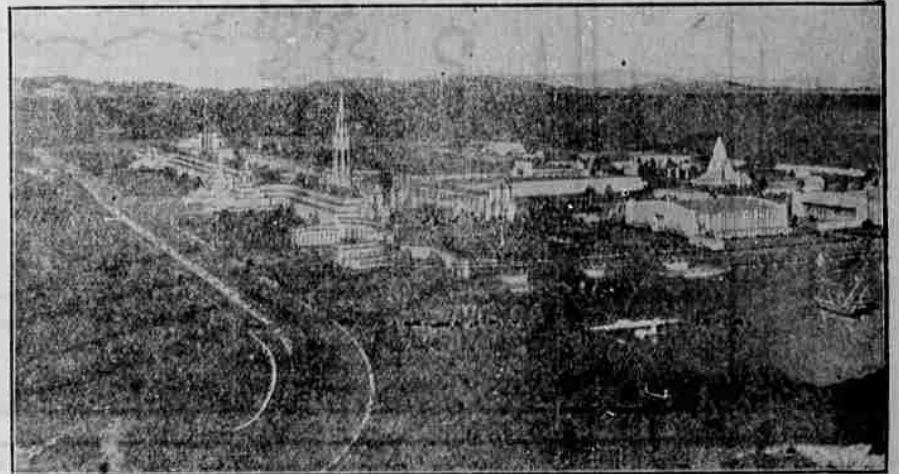

GOVERNMENT BOMBER BROUGHT DOWN NEAR MADRID



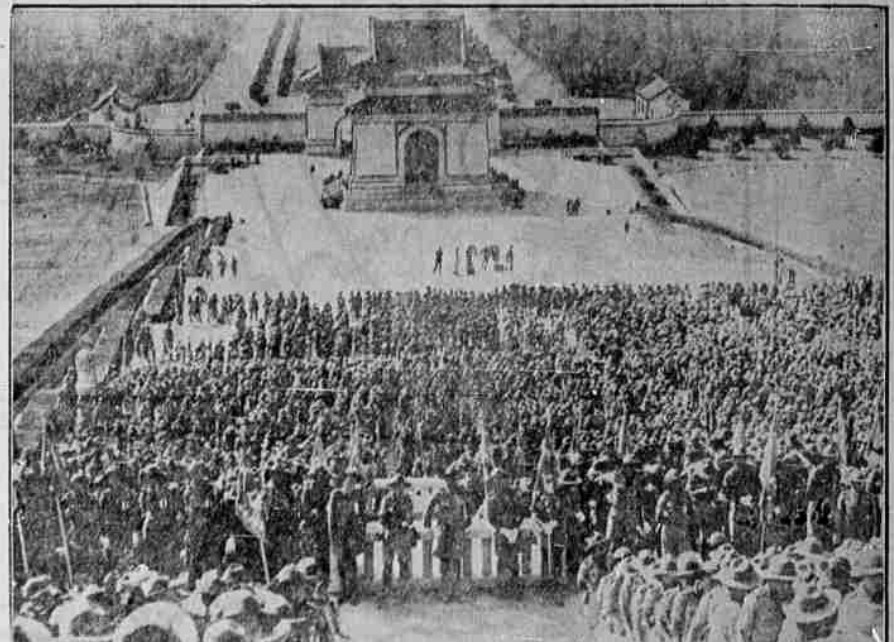
