Gypsy Rose Lee Says \$25,000 Worth of Jewels Taken By Six Gunmen—Police See Publicity Gag.

PLAN DIPLOMACY TO HEAL BREACH IN LABOR UNION

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 28.—(AP)—Behind-the-scenes diplomacy will precede further formal peace negotiations between the American Federation of Labor and John L. Lewis' rebel unions.

This policy was adopted by the federation's executive council today after it reviewed the convention's order to continue efforts to end labor's big civil war.

George M. Harrison, the federation's chief peace maker, plans to talk either with Lewis or with persons close to the rebel leader within the next few days. He expects to sound out Lewis' sentiment toward a number of definite peace proposals. He also may communicate with other leaders of the rebel committee for industrial organization.

INDUSTRY, FINANCE LEADERS TO FACE SENATE PROBERS

List of Witnesses Ranges From Professional Strike Breakers To J. P. Morgan—New Tax Set-up Aim.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Senate investigators announced today they planned to have three major inquiries—involving scores of industrial and financial leaders—under full steam within the next few weeks.

A list of witnesses ranging from professional strike breakers to J. P. Morgan may be summoned, as the committee press their studies of civil liberties violations, campaign expenditures and railway financing.

Plan New Tax Set-Up Two other congressional fact-finding committees—the house appropriation committee and the joint committee on internal revenue taxation—are scheduled to get down to work weeks before congress convenes January 5.

GAS AND GUNS READY TO OUST PICKETS IN CELERY STRIKE ZONE

STOCKTON, Cal., Nov. 28.—(AP)—Armed with tear gas guns, riot guns and rifles, and aided by an airplane, sheriff's deputies patrolled the highway of the terminus celery district today, under instructions of Sheriff Harvey Odell to "keep those pickets out of here."

The sheriff ordered 300 special deputies into the barricaded area and ranchers armed with pick handles helped the deputies guard the highway into the hundred square miles of the celery district.

An airplane dived through foggy skies, on the lookout for possible picket highway caravans.

The only untoward incident reported was the arrest of two men charged with picketing near the terminus.

WHIPPING POST IS ISSUE IN WASH'N.

SEATTLE, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The whipping-post, with lashes for women as well as men, became an issue in Washington state today.

The State Bar association's legislative committee prepared to poll all attorneys of the state as to their attitude toward legalizing this form of punishment for crime.

Opposition to the whipping-post sprang somewhat surprisingly, from women believing in "equal rights and equal responsibilities." Miss Beah Whitehead, a Seattle justice of the peace, made the point that "women's skins are no tenderer than men's."

INFORMER SLATED FOR MURDER TRIAL

SEATTLE, Nov. 28.—(AP)—Presiding Judge Clay Allen set December 16 for the trial on charges of first degree murder of Lester A. Roski, who turned state's evidence and caused conviction of his brother-in-law, John J. O'Donnell, in the murders of patrolmen Trent A. Siskles and Theodore A. Stevens a year ago Thanksgiving day.

The jury also convicted O'Donnell's brother, Joseph, who admitted complicity in the killings, when he took the witness stand and sought to absolve John O'Donnell.

The officers were shot to death while investigating a slot machine hijacking in a north side beer tavern. Roski was shot in the knee. He said he shot himself accidentally while fleeing.

NAVY OFFICERS WIFE HIT-SKIP VICTIM ON NAVY OFFICER'S WIFE

VALLEJO, Cal., Nov. 28.—(AP)—While funeral services were held today for Mrs. Jean Pomeroy, wife of a navy officer, police continued search for a hit-run automobile driver believed responsible for her death.

Mrs. Pomeroy, 36, died shortly after she was found injured on a highway near a night club early Thursday. Sheriff Jack Thornton said he was convinced she was struck by an automobile.

The sheriff said a Vallejo boy, whose name was withheld, claimed to have seen a black sedan strike her and speed away.

Mrs. Pomeroy, wife of Lieutenant Commander R. E. A. Pomeroy, medical corps, U. S. N., had left the night club, companions said, to get an article she had left in an automobile outside. Her husband is seriously ill in the Mare Island navy hospital.

She was a native of Eugene, Ore., and, besides her widower, leaves a 10-year old daughter, Jean Louise; her parents, Mrs. Eugenia Cook of Portland, Ore., and Drew Griffin of Buffalo, N. Y., and a sister and brother, Mrs. J. L. Harrison of San Francisco, Ore., and G. W. Griffin of San Francisco.

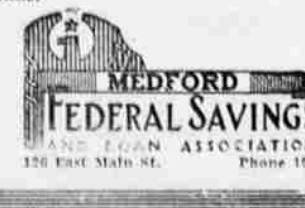
