

Screen Version of "The Green Pastures", Pulitzer Play, Now At Holly

LARGE CAST, MUSIC NUMBERS FEATURED IN DRAMATIC FILM

"The Green Pastures," picturization of Marc Connelly's Pulitzer Prize play that ran 18 months on Broadway and then another three and a half years throughout the United States, reaches the screen of the Holly theater today, where it opens a three-day run.

The picture, which retains all the unique qualities of the play, has been given the wider scope of the screen that shows scenes which were only hinted at in the stage production. If for no other reason, the unlimited space and magic of the camera have wrought a miracle that the stage could never dream of.

The story, representing the primitive conception of the Bible and its characters, is filled with delightful humor, although presented with a reverence that removes any objection that might arise. It begins in a Sunday school of the old South attended by children who asked their pastor to explain Heaven to them.

The story of the creation and the subsequent sins of mankind on earth and the glory of Heaven are then revealed in picture form as interpreted by the colored preacher. Naturally, his ideas of Heaven and its characters take expression from the darkies' viewpoint. It is this expression that lifts the picture out of the ordinary and into the unique novelty that it is.

The entire cast is composed of colored players, with 111 speaking parts and nearly a thousand others, headed by Rex Ingram, in the role of "De Lawd." The famous Hall Johnson choir of 60 voices sets off the picture's musical background, one of its greatest attractions.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The treasury concluded today that war veterans are getting ready for Christmas buying.

Redemption of bonus bonds has been increased in the past few weeks, reversing the trend of preceding months.

In the week ending Nov. 20 veterans cashed \$5,030,200 in bonds and in the week ending Nov. 13 the total was \$5,757,650.

Of the \$1,728,858,100 in bonds issued last June \$1,307,818,800, or 75.3 per cent, have been cashed.
