GREEN BAY PROS CLOSE TO TITLE

CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—(AP)—The Green Bay Packers, who dominated the national professional football league picture from 1929 through 1931, today needed just one more victory in the east-west playoff to win their fourth championship.

The powerful Packers won their ninth straight game yesterday by downing the 1035 titholders, Detroit, 26 to 17 before 22,000 spectators. The defeat ended Detroit's last mathematical chance of getting into the east-west playoff and assured Green Bay of the western section title on a record of 10 victories and one defeat, with one game to play.

The Chicago Bears, who had engaged the Packers in a hot stretch duel for the western crown, saw their last hopes fade when they were upset 14 to 7 by their snappy hometown rivals, the Cardinals.

SPUD LEWIS QUILTS AS DONS GRIDIRON COACH

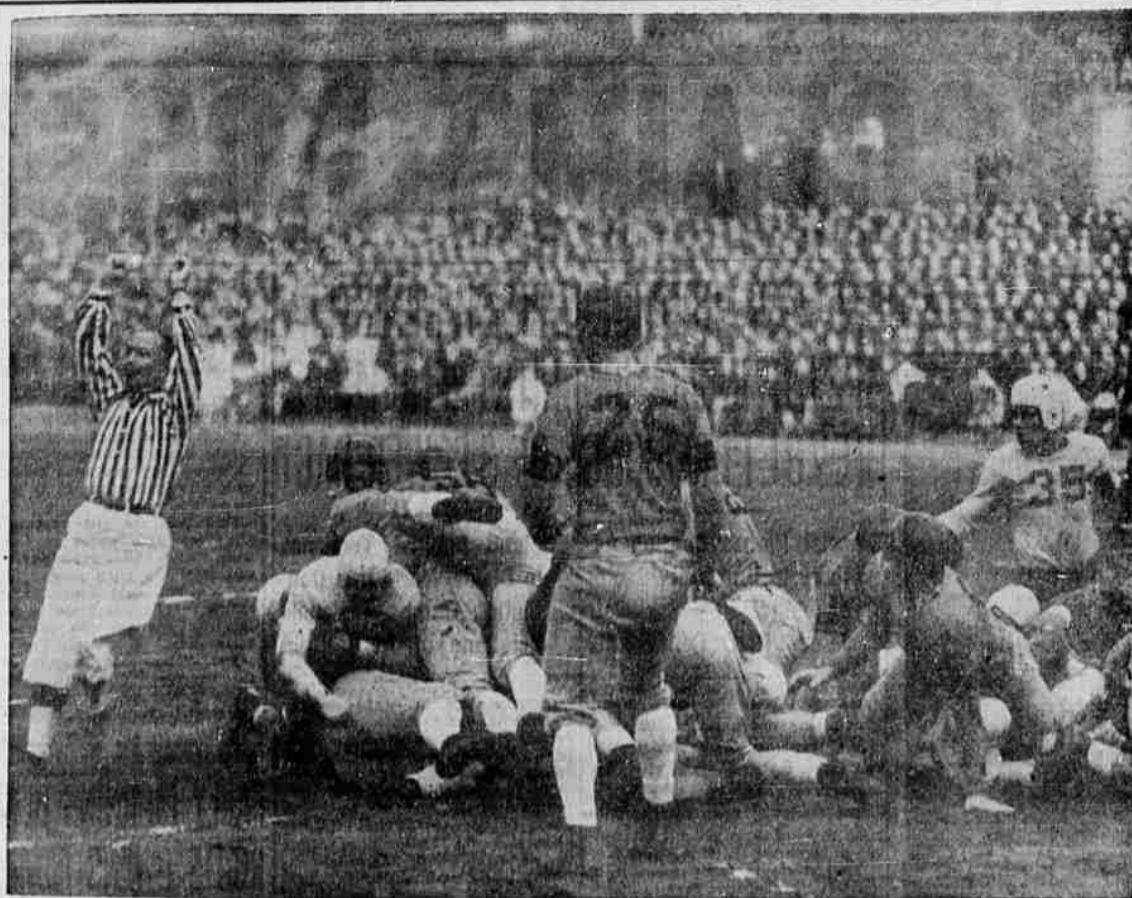
The Linfield team will play 10 other practice games, four with Southern Oregon Normal and the remainder with Portland fives.

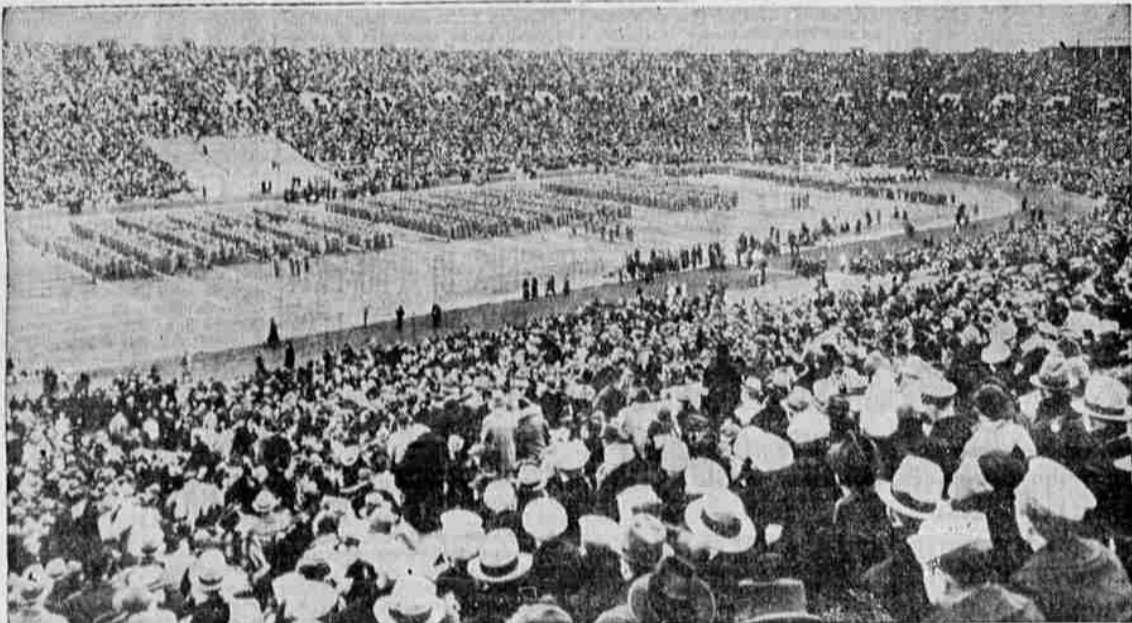

SHUTE, GOLF ACE, USES WARD CLUBS

PINEHURST, N. C., Nov. 30.—Crowned professional golf champion of the United States here a week ago by defeating Jimmy Thompson, long shot artist, 3 and 2, in the 36-hole final match, Denny Shute today took time off to review the reasons for his victory.

Shute's victory brought him the honor denied him five years ago when he finished as P. G. A. runner-up to Tom Creaty. It also earned him \$1,000 and a year's possession of the Wansmaker trophy.

The new champion credited his win to the fact that he was in the best physical condition of the year and because his golf clubs stood him in good stead through the grueling preliminary matches and the final. He uses his own personal model clubs, designed by him exclusively for Montgomery Ward, the well known retail and mail order organization.

Shute, who first won fame as an amateur, is 32 years old and the son of Herman Shute, English born professional. He turned pro in 1929. Since 1929, his tournament winnings have totaled \$30,744. His scoring average for 1935 was 72.96 strokes, and for the 1936 season 72.58.

His major golf accomplishments include a membership on the Ryder cup team two years—in 1931 and again in 1933, winning the British open championships at St. Andrews the latter year. Last year he captured the national two ball round robin.

Formerly the pro at Chicago's Westward Ho club, Shute is now stationed at the exclusive Brae Burn club of West Newton, Mass.

Often called the "silent man of golf," Shute is also one of the slimmest. Lacking eight pounds in the P. G. A. tourney leaves him even lighter than usual.

Shute's are plants which renew themselves by new growth from the base of the plant.

BEER PARLORS TARGET IN LAW CHANGE MOVE

PORTLAND, Nov. 30.—(AP)—The approaching January session of the legislature gave rise today to reports of numerous bills which various interests will seek to enact—among them a move to transfer the sale of beer and wine to state stores.

The objective would be to add to state revenues and wipe out objectionable resorts. Strenuous opposition from beer dispensers was indicated promptly.

Another measure to be introduced will seek a Sunday closing law. Adolph Rebe, president of the Independent Merchants association, said 90 percent of merchants canvassed favor the proposed bill.

KLAMATH GROCER DIES IN BEND AUTO CRASH

BEND, Nov. 30.—(AP)—An automobile, hitting a shoulder of gravel and apparently hurtling out of control, killed George Hicks, associated with a Klamath Falls-Bend wholesale grocery house, and seriously hurt a companion, identified as Goldie Jackson, Bend, Sunday.

The accident occurred on the Dalles-California highway six miles north of here. State police, expressing the belief the machine had plunged out of control, said a broken brace of the car top pierced Hicks' spine. The woman suffered a broken back.

BOY SLUMBERS AS FIRE RAZES HOME

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Flames drove 100 children from their beds last night and one small boy narrowly escaped burning in a fire which destroyed the main quarters of the children's farm home at Lacey, seven miles north of here.

Starting on the roof of the three-story frame building, the fire spread rapidly. Attendants in the home roused the children and marched them outside, while Olympia fire trucks were speeding there.

Firemen, on a swift inspection to make certain all children were out, found one 10-year-old boy sound asleep while the fire crackled overhead. A fireman picked up the boy and carried him to safety, still asleep.

Fire Chief R. E. Holcomb of Olympia said most of the furnishings were saved and the loss probably would not exceed \$4,000.
