COURT TO ADMIT ALIENS TUESDAY TO CITIZENSHIP

Qualified aliens will be admitted to American citizenship by Judge James Alger Fee in federal court at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, it was announced today by Glenn O. Taylor, deputy court clerk.

Thomas S. Griffing, district deputy director of immigration and naturalization, was in the federal building today receiving declarations of intentions to become citizens and examining applicants for preliminary and final papers.

Federal court will open its second session of the year here at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. Several criminal and civil cases are on the calendar. Court officials and attaches are expected to arrive from Portland this evening.

During the court session, the Crater lake national park staff will occupy quarters in the basement of the federal building. The staff will return to the court offices at the end of the session.

Criminal cases scheduled for trial include that of Roland Hicks who is charged with murder. Hicks is charged with the death of Irwin Johnson, a fellow Klamath reservation Indian.

WORK PROGRESSES AT PRESCOTT PARK

Although Company 3864 has been in the Medford district less than two months, the men of Camp Prescott have already settled down to a very efficient routine, both on the work project and in camp, officers said today.

The cooperation of the army and park service staff and the enrollees themselves has been the biggest factor in the company's success, it was stressed.

The work projects in the Prescott park are making rapid headway. The right of way for a truck trail has been cleared for two miles and a quarter of a mile has actually been completed. Tables and benches are being completed and will be set in the picnic area. The main road leading into the park and down Roxy Anne mountain has been gravelled approximately three miles during the past month.

A well-rounded educational program is now functioning smoothly. Classes are conducted four nights a week with 90 per cent of all enrollees taking part. In addition, about 30 per cent are taking correspondence courses.

SELECT JURY FOR PERMANENT WAVE DAMAGE HEARING

A jury was selected in circuit court this morning in the damage action of Mrs. Helen (Archie) Pierce against William H. Murray, Iva Hoagland and Mann's Department store, for injuries allegedly suffered while receiving a permanent wave, in a beauty parlor in the store.

Mrs. Pierce, a former resident of Ashland, seeks \$2500 damages and \$75 for medical services.

Five women, Mrs. Margaret Fabrick, Mrs. Mildred Drury, Mrs. Glenn O. Taylor, and Mrs. Fred E. Wahl, all of Medford and Mrs. Betta Pankey of Central Point were drawn and accepted as jurors.

Mrs. Pierce cites in her complaint that, on February 1, she went to the beauty parlor to obtain a "permanent wave," and that Mrs. Iva Hoagland placed an apparatus, heated by electricity upon her head. She alleges that through the carelessness of the operator, she received four burns, two upon each temple. Though the burns have healed, she claims the tissue was injured.

The defense charges contributory negligence upon the part of Mrs. Pierce alleging she did not apprise the attendant of any discomfort.

Jurors were asked by counsel, in preliminary examinations, if they had any prejudices against beauty shops or treatments.

The defendants are represented by Attorney Peter J. Neff and Attorney Otto Frohmayer, the plaintiff by Attorney George M. Roberts and Attorney William McAllister.

The case is expected to be completed in the hands of the jury by tomorrow noon.
