COACH WILL SCAN CAGE TALENT FOR VARSITY QUINTET

Medford High Students Will All Get Chance to Show Wares in Inter-Class Tournament Play Says Mentor

The job of molding a varsity basketball team out of a conglomeration of green material will be started in earnest by Coach Bill Bowerman at the senior high school gymnasium this afternoon.

Every student out for the game will be given an opportunity to demonstrate his court skill in an inter-class tournament scheduled to get under way at 4 o'clock this afternoon, the tourney having been chosen by Bowerman as the fairest, quickest and surest way to develop talent.

With practically unseasoned material to work with, the high school mentor has a tough assignment to develop an efficient court machine and he is eager to bring the promising players to the forefront as quickly as possible. Only six veterans of last year's varsity squad are left for this season's grueling schedule.

64 Answer Call
Sixty-four men reported at the first call yesterday, the largest turnout in years. With such a large squad to work with, Bowerman decided to utilize the class tournament plan to reveal the best talent and reduce the field to workable proportions.

Seven teams were organized from the 64 embryos. There are two first term sophomore teams, two first term junior units and one each from the other classes.

The elimination tournament will get under way this afternoon with the second team of the first term sophomores lined up against the second unit of the first term juniors and the second term seniors facing the second term juniors.

Spectators will be welcome to the tournament games and no admission will be charged, Bowerman said.

Season Opens January 22
The basketball conference season opens here with Klamath Falls on January 22, the two teams to meet again in the senior gym the following night.

Several non-conference games will be played on the road before inauguration of the league season. The earliest game now scheduled is with Salem high school in Salem on January 7 and Bowerman expects to slate a few practice contests before pitting his team against real high school talent.

COAST ALL-STAR SQUAD SELECTED IN U. P. POLL

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 1.—(UP)—The jury has spoken and its verdict presents today the United Press all-coast all-star football team for 1936.

The team chosen by the votes of the sports editors of United Press client newspapers in the far west represents eight colleges, six of them members of the Pacific coast conference and the other two members of the so-called independent group.

Three Huskies Named
University of Washington, which will represent the west in the Rose Bowl New Year's Day, placed three of its stars on the first team.

Santa Clara, only undefeated, untied eleven in the nation, won two places, Washington State, Oregon, Stanford, California, Gonzaga and U. S. C. each won one place.

Ed Goddard, Washington State back, was chosen captain of the team. He polled the largest number of votes given any one of the 120 candidates who caught the eye of the selectors during the season.

PITTSBURGH, YALE ENJOY MONOPOLY ALL-EAST BERTHS

Three Pitt Linesmen Make First Team—Yale Places Pair—Penn and Dartmouth Each Capture One

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Pittsburgh and Yale, representing separate competitive spheres in one of the most exciting seasons in the history of football's original battleground, monopolized honors today in the all-eastern selections, compiled by the Associated Press.

Three members of the stalwart Pitt line, Bill Dadio at end, Captain Bill Glassford at guard, and Averell Daniell at tackle, occupied positions on the first team, with Tony Mattai at tackle and Marshall Goldberg at halfback on the second eleven.

Yale, with Captain Larry Kelley at end and Clint Frank in the backfield, helped the "Ivy league" make the best showing among eastern all-stars in a decade. Princeton, Pennsylvania and Dartmouth each captured one place.

ROSE BOWL OPPONENT MAY BE KNOWN LATE IN WEEK, SAYS PHELAN
SEATTLE, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Coach Jimmy Phelan, probably more interested than anybody else in the selection of an opponent for the University of Washington in the Rose Bowl game, predicted today that the announcement would not be made before next Saturday or Monday.

After Ray Eckmann, Washington's athletic director, left by plane yesterday for San Francisco and Los Angeles, Phelan said he would follow tomorrow by train.

"I don't think the opposition will be announced before I arrive in Los Angeles Saturday to attend the Southern California—Notre Dame game, and the Pacific Coast conference meeting," he said.

"It is probable the nomination will be placed before the conference as a whole before being made final." The conference session opens Monday.

The coach admitted that Louisiana State, Alabama and Pittsburgh were the outstanding teams being considered, but he said he did not believe Washington officials had yet decided on a "first choice."

SARAZEN URGES PROS DELETE MEDAL PLAY TO ADD TOURNERY FIRE

AUGUSTA, Ga., Dec. 1.—(AP)—Gene Sarazen, the Connecticut farmer-golfer, thinks the professionals should give the game a new act, and suggested today that the pros delete the present medal play events.

"What golf needs," said the stocky veteran, "is a switch to match play. These medal play tournaments are becoming horrid, not only to the pros but to the public. They lack the competitive fire, the old dog fight that carries gallery appeal."

Sarazen, who won the national open title in 1922 and 1932, said he was going to initiate a campaign to that end, adding he believed the majority of professionals would favor the change.

"I'll tell you another thing that would help golf," he said, "we could have a rose bowl affair of our own, say with a \$25,000 cash prize to the winner in a tournament bringing together all of the big shots at the end of the year."

"With \$25,000 earned in one event you wouldn't have to go around playing in these two-bit affairs every year. You could get by nicely for four or five years on twenty-five thousand bucks."

SCHMELING FEARFUL OF 'RUN-AROUND' IN CHANCE AT CHAMPION

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Max Schmeling, who apparently trusts nobody in these United States, is coming here personally to see they do not give him the "old run-around" in the matter of a shot at the title of Heavyweight Champion James J. Braddock.

From Berlin the German, who leaped back into the pugilistic spotlight with his surprising 12-round knockout of Joe Louis last June, cabled the New York state athletic commission he would be on hand December 11, when contracts for his promised fight with Braddock next June are scheduled to be filed.

When his September bout with Braddock was postponed because the champion was temporarily kayoed by an arthritis attack, Schmeling sailed for Germany with the promise of both Braddock and the New York state athletic commission that he would be the first to get a chance at the title held by the erstwhile New Jersey longshoreman.

Since then Schmeling has read with considerable alarm reports that they are planning to match Braddock with Joe Louis in a no-decision go in Atlantic City in February. He knows that if Louis should knock out Braddock, the negro would be hailed by the public as the unofficial heavyweight champion.
