MINERAL SURVEY GETS UNDER WAY IN ROGUE VALLEY

The west coast, for the cost of finished products concerns all of us." Surveys have already been made in eastern Oregon; eastern Washington and western Idaho. Mr. Swartley said. "The government has no intention of developing any deposits," Mr. Swartley emphasized. "It is merely collecting facts for the use of industry."
Among the ores the survey will include are limestone, iron, manganese, quartzite, coal, chromite, kaolin, asbestos and bauxite, he related.
"Our work in no way conflicts with what a state survey would do," he stated. "In fact state aid would lighten our task and give the government information much quicker. It is to be regretted that Oregon has not continued its mineral survey."

On Rialto Bill

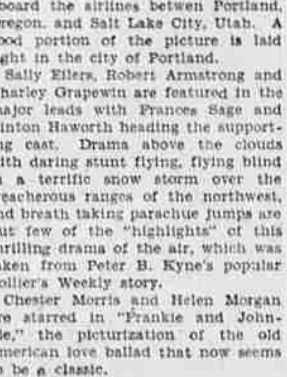

CLASS ONE RAILROADS MAKE BETTER PROFIT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.-(AP)-The Associated American Railroads reported today 130 class one carriers had a net operating income of \$88,477,437 in October, compared with \$74,043,657 in the same month last year.
The figures represent 98.4 per cent of total operating revenues of all class one carriers, the association said.
Operating revenues thus far this year total \$385,421,543 compared with \$335,044,700 last year. Operating expenses in October were \$257,284,138 compared with \$229,218,391 for the same month of 1935.
