WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Newly made Lt. Col. James Roosevelt will draw \$404 per month while on active duty with the president.

Not even the elites of army, navy and marine officers begrudged son James the appointment. He is needed by the president on trips, for physical assistance, and has been helping off and on for four years without remuneration. . . . MINISTER BALDWIN SEEKS SHOWDOWN IN CALL ON EDWARD

Cabinet May Quit Unless Sovereign Gives Up Any Plan to Marry American-Born Divorcee, Is Belief

Ultimatum Delivered.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin called upon King Edward at Buckingham palace tonight for what was reported to be a showdown in the constitutional crisis caused by the monarch's friendship for Mrs. Wallis Simpson.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—(AP)—England's stock market dropped slightly today, reflecting, brokers said, the growing concern lest King Edward's romance with Mrs. Wallis Simpson result in resignation of the cabinet or even the abdication of the king.

In Fleet street the rumor was described as coming from "high quarters." Cabinet members preserved a stony silence.

The stock exchange, England's traditional barometer, was rife with discussion of the Bishop of Bradford's speech yesterday in which he expressed concern over the king's awareness of his need for "God's grace."
