LONDON, Dec. 2.- (AP)-The House of Lords today rejected the bill to legalize "mercy deaths," by a vote of 15 to 14.

The Euthanasia proposal was snuffed under by the peers after a sharp, brief debate in which Lord Dawson of Penn, the king's physician, and the Archbishop of Canterbury both opposed it.

"It is an extreme case," Canterbury said, "where it is morally legitimate to shorten a life of pain, they should be left for the medical profession to deal with."

INDIANA FARMER IS CORN CHAMP

CHICAGO, Dec. 2.- (AP)-William M. Curry of Tipton, Ind., won the world's corn growing championship at the 18th international grain and hay show today.

With Curry's victory, the show's premier award went to Indiana for the 14th time. Curry defeated William Carl Lewis of Jeffersonville, Ind., the 1935 king.

He won with a sample of Reid's Yellow Dent, a variety which has won the grand championship six times before.

G. Page, a sleek Aberdeen-Angus waddled to the dias of the international livestock show today as the grand champion steer of 1936, a king among 14,653 head of livestock in the 37th exposition.

The big black steer came from the Oklahoma A. and M. college farm at Stillwater, Oklahoma. The new king is a youngster of six months.

Super Domino, a hereford, from the Wyoming Hereford ranch at Cheyenne, Wyo., was named the reserve champion steer.

HALT JAP DRIVE INTO MONGOLIA

PEIPING, Wed., Dec. 2.- (UP)-Japan's penetration of western inner Mongolia has been blocked and all Japanese military missions to the west of the Peking-Miao are being withdrawn, Chinese military dispatches said today.

"The entire military position in inner Mongolia has been changed and the authority of the central National government has been re-established, Chinese commanders asserted.

INCOME TO EQUAL FEDERAL SPENDING IS SEEN FOR 1937

Forecast Based On Improving Business - No Definite Statements Made As to Balancing of Budget

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.- (AP)-Substantial revenue increases during the first five months of this year today raised administration hopes that the seven year gap between income and outgo may be closed next year.

Administration leaders have forecast that improving business will boost receipts to the level of expenditures if the present tax structure is maintained.

There has been no definite statement, however, that the budget will be balanced next year.

Income Gives Hope. Surveilling income from last July 1 through November 27, fiscal experts said today that continuance of the present uptrend, plus some reduction in relief expenditures would balance receipts and spending next year.

Receipts for this period totaled \$9,625,043,000, an increase of \$171,981,000 over a year ago. In the forefront of individual tax increases were income taxes, which, at \$418,898,000, gained \$91,498,000.

Questioned at his press conference late yesterday, Secretary Morgenthau said March tax receipts would be "very large," and "up to expectations." This was taken to mean that revenues for this year will reach the \$5,642,760,000 estimate, or \$1,538,804,000 and emergency expenditures at \$1,148,000,000.

Authorized treasury sources said that reductions in expenditures next year can be accomplished only by restricting emergency activities.

Slightly higher budget estimates are anticipated for "regular" government activities, they explained, because national defense, social security and other long range programs already under way anticipate increased outlays in 1937-38.

Relief Pouring More Cash Into Federal coffers, fiscal experts pointed out that a continued business upswing will reduce the relief load.

Thus far, the Roosevelt administration's deficits have about matched the sums expended for "recovery and relief." Through November 27, this year's deficits stood at \$1,230,000,000 and emergency expenditures at \$1,148,000,000.

WORSTED MILL BUSY AS PICKETS TRAMP

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 2.- (AP)-The whirl of machinery vied for interest with the tramp-tramp of pickets at the Worsted mill today.

The plant was opened yesterday with 60 employees under guard of city and state police. There was no violence.

O. E. Sandurant, plant superintendent, said additional employees returned to work today. Homes of workers in the Hillwood district were under surveillance of police.

HIGHWAY OFFICIALS GOING TO MEETING

SALEM, Dec. 2.- (AP)-J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway commission, will leave this week for San Francisco to attend the annual meeting of the American Association of Highway Engineers, where he will present a paper dealing with legal points on rights of way.

The three members of the highway commission, Chairman Henry F. Campbell, Ed Aldrich and F. M. Touvelle and Highway Engineer R. H. Baldoe will also attend the session next week.

YALE GRID STAR HELD OUTSTANDING IN YEAR

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.- (AP)-Larry Kieley, captain and end of the 1936 Yale football team, today was declared winner of the Heisman Memorial trophy, awarded annually by the Downtown Athletic club to the outstanding college football player of the year. The trophy will be presented to Kieley at a luncheon on December 16.

Sam Francis of Nebraska was runner-up, with Ray Bulvid of Marquette third.
