NINETY DAYS AND \$50 ANDERSON'S SENTENCE FOR DRUNKEN DRIVING

Harold J. (Swede) Anderson, convicted by a circuit court jury of driving an auto while intoxicated, was sentenced to serve 90 days in the county jail, and fined \$50 by Judge H. D. Norton this morning. Anderson was remanded to the custody of the sheriff, and started serving his sentence at once.

The previous convictions rested against Anderson, well known throughout southern Oregon as an athlete. He played football on two Medford high state champion squads, on the freshman team at the University of Oregon, and at the Southern Oregon Normal school.

"You are apparently popular, and have many friends, but it must be impressed upon your mind you cannot drive an auto while intoxicated," the court told Anderson, before passing sentence. "The law covering violations of auto regulations must be enforced and upheld."

Pleas in behalf of Anderson were made by his counsel, Porter J. Neff, and by Attorney E. E. Kelly.

"I have known Anderson for a long time," Attorney Kelly said, "and know nothing about him except a tendency to drink too much occasionally, and drive an auto."

Anderson was arrested last April, after driving an auto in a weaving manner through Saturday night traffic on Riverside avenue, but without mishap.

For a number of months Anderson has been a member of the city fire department.

ROSE BOUND OVER FOR GRAND JURY

Paul Rose, charged in a complaint signed by Eula Peck, with pointing a firearm at her Thursday, waived preliminary hearing in justice court today and was ordered held to the grand jury under \$500 bond.

Rose, according to the district attorney, allegedly shot the lock off the door of a house on Boardman street, when denied admission, using a .30-30 calibre rifle.

John Louis Patterson of Grants Pass, pleaded guilty to driving an auto on the Pacific Highway, with four persons "over the age of 12 years" in the front seat. A fine of \$5 and costs was imposed and paid.

Alden Galbreath of Gold Hill pleaded guilty to operating a truck without license plates and was assessed \$5 and costs.
