County School Superintendent C. R. Bowman announced today that he will hold the regular examination of applicants for state teacher certificates at the court house commencing Wednesday, December 16, at 9 a. m. and continuing until Friday, December 18, at 4 p. m.

The schedule of subjects follows: Wednesday forenoon: U. S. history, writing (penmanship), geometry, botany.

Wednesday afternoon: Physiology, reading, composition, general history. Thursday forenoon: Arithmetic, history of education, psychology, geology.

Thursday afternoon: Grammar, geography, American literature, physics. Friday forenoon: Theory and practice, orthography (spelling), physical geography, English literature.

Friday afternoon: School law, algebra, civil government, bookkeeping.

KOLESNIKOFF—A RUSSIAN COBBLER—QUIT HIS TRADE, MASQUERADED AS A DOCTOR, ROSE TO THE POST OF CHIEF SURGEON OF THE KIEFF HOSPITALS, AND PERFORMED 600 MAJOR OPERATIONS WITH GREAT SUCCESS BEFORE HE WAS EXPOSED.

Awl to Scalpel
Coming into the possession of the license and credentials of a deceased Russian doctor named Mook, Kolesnikoff, a humble cobbler, masqueraded as the dead man and started practicing surgery early in the 19th century.

Strange as it seems, the shoe repairer proved a brilliant success as a mender of bodies. Rising to the exalted position of chief surgeon at the Kieff hospitals he performed 600 major operations with a far lower death record than the average surgeon of his time.

When Kolesnikoff's true identity came to light in October, 1820, he was tried for "quackery." In the

course of his trial it was disclosed that he had performed his operations with "brutal rapidity." To this fact, Dr. Robert T. Morris, noted medical authority, attributes Kolesnikoff's success with this method he avoided hemorrhage and shock.

The Floating Postoffice

Detroit river is listed in the U. S. official postal guide as a station of the Detroit, Michigan, post office. On its waters ply the only floating postal unit in inland waters of the U. S., the 65-foot mail boat, "O. F. Mook."

To exchange mail, the "O. F. Mook" draws up alongside other craft keeping about three feet away. Proceeding

in the same direction and at the same speed as the other vessel, a bucket attached to a rope is let down over the side of the mail boat, a man on the other boat catches hold of it, "posts" whatever mail there is to be dispatched, and the bucket is drawn back to the "post office."

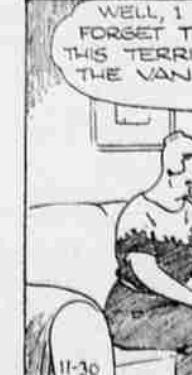
