

BOY AUTO THIEVES RUN FOUL OF LAW DURING STOP HERE

Two Yakima, Wash., youths are the latest to discover the hazards of attempting to run the gauntlet of Medford police vigilance in a stolen auto, and Chester Franklin Green, 18, and Robert William Killian, 18, are today lodged in the city bastille awaiting word from northern authorities.

At 9 o'clock last night the city prowl car was making its way out South Riverside when the two city officers in it noticed something suspicious about the actions of two young men in a new Nash sedan. Swinging the spotlight on the two the officers passed, then swung back to make a more thorough inspection. Deciding the time had come to do the disappearing act, the two youths took to the cover of darkness, abandoning the machine.

The officers gave chase but lost the two in a maze of packing houses. At 11:20 the two officers decided to look in the various, eight spots, and found Killian and Green devouring a bowl of chili at the Brass Ball. They were immediately placed under arrest, for it had been discovered the Nash sedan belonged to Charles Wing, Medford real estate man, who had parked it on a driveway on South Riverside while visiting friends.

The two readily admitted the attempted theft, police said, telling investigating officers that they had pushed the car from the driveway to the street so the sound of the starting motor would not arouse the owner's suspicions.

In the meantime an abandoned Ford V-8 sedan had been found on the streets. It had switched license plates. Also the police had received a report from the Safeway store at Sixth and Riverside that two young men had been found prowling around the back seat of a car in their parking lot, and that the two had escaped in a Ford V-8 sedan when clerks gave chase.

Green and Killian admitted that, too, saying they were looking for a rear seat cushion for the Ford they were driving, which they said they had stolen in Yakima. They said, in signed confessions, that they had stolen the car in the Washington city and had filled it with gasoline there, driving out of the service station without paying and heading south. In Portland they stole a set of Oregon plates and threw the Washington tags away, they stated. On the way south they sold a spare tire and wheel from the car to get gasoline; at one place Green sold his boots for 50 cents and bought gasoline.

Near Grants Pass, their confessions admit, they stole a robe, a flashlight and a .30-30 hunting rifle from a parked car. At the Coos Bay Junction with the Pacific highway they picked up a hitch-hiker but told police that the wayfarer had nothing to do with the thefts. They said they had not been stopped by officers between Yakima and Medford.

Green said he had served 10 months in the Washington state training school at Chehalis in 1934, and that he had been sent to the Oregon state training school at Woodburn in July of this year for the theft of a car in Salem. He ran away from the training school after three days, he said. Killian assured police he had never before been in conflict with the law.

City police here were awaiting word today as to the disposition of their two youthful prisoners. Aside from the theft of the car in Washington, the theft of articles from cars, and

the attempted theft of the Wing auto, the two face charges of violation of the federal Dyer act, which forbids the transportation of a stolen auto across a state line.

Killian had a .32 automatic pistol in his possession when arrested.

TABLE ROCK, Dec. 4.—(Sp1)—The long, cold spell following the dryest fall in years is causing considerable uneasiness among stock men, who are beginning to inquire about hay and other feeds to make up for the lack of range fodder.

Irrigation water is being used on the Brennerholt farm in an effort to soften the soil enough to permit plowing.

Very little fall grain has been seeded here and what has been put in the ground is still in the dormant stage because of lack of moisture to start sprouting.

Dusty roads and fields, dry and parched leaves still clinging to the trees and other freakish signs mark the present season as one of the queerest seen in the valley for many years residents report.

Some old timers claim that the fall of '39 was as dry, but Lee Claton, Sams Valley postmaster who grew up in the valley, disputes this, claiming it might have been a dry fall but there was enough rain to bring up plenty of grass, the ground having been green at Christmas.

Heavy snows fell early in January of that winter, staying until March, when they melted with a warm rain, causing one of the valley's worst floods.
