

SHANGLE TO SHOW BABY PORTRAITS IN HOTEL LOBBY

More than 140 personality portraits from the Shangle Baby Salon will be displayed in the Hotel Medford lobby Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday for public inspection. E. P. Neil, manager of the Eastman Kodak store in Portland, and Sam Sims, artist and photographer of Trail, have been selected as judges to award \$150 in cash prizes and numerous merchandise gifts to winners in the baby show.

J. Verne Shangle has devoted considerable time during the past two months in photographing the young contestants in their most appealing poses. The entries will not be judged for beauty but for personality and individuality. Each portrait is eight by ten inches in size and double mounted on a large mat which is an effective background for the hand torn first mounting. There are three classes in the Shangle Baby Salon, the first including the youngest group from three months to one year; the second boys and girls from one to three years and the third those from three to five.

The Simpson Case.
To the Editor:
Your article in the issue of December 1 was interesting, and exposed some of the peculiar features of the English monarchy. There is, however, one very pronounced trait in the British make-up which you barely touched on. You referred to it diffidently with the words: "Solid moral principles of middle class respectability."
The Englishman is theoretically democratic, and so is his government; but he is, nevertheless, extremely arrogant, smug and dictatorial when it comes to strict conventional propriety. Here, in the U. S., scandals, divorces and fantastic romances are aired out in papers with big headlines. People gloat over them, discuss them and think it's all lots of fun. Not so in England; there a public scandal is a horror, and the higher up the rank of the principals the more they try to hush it up.

A divorce, although not completely ostracized, still is viewed with suspicion. But when twice divorced public opinion is aroused.
The grandfather of the king was known to have led a depraved, immoral life at periods of his life, even after he was married. But it was all hushed up. The British worship the royalty almost as semi-divine. The copious, long-winded and ridiculous columns of adulation written about the king on the recent death of his father, makes the people feel all the more outraged at his name being so repeatedly linked with a woman twice divorced. They do not take into consideration the fact that Mrs. Simpson was justified and exonerated.

It is not the British superior sense of morality, but his unctuous, hypocritical, somewhat snobbish sense of respectability.
If the king were to have a secret morganatic marriage, avoiding all publicity, then later divorce and marry a princess the British public would not feel scandalized. Although such a procedure would be outrageously immoral and selfish, viewed from a conscientious, humane point of view.
If King Edward breaks away from

time-honored royal prerogatives, acts conscientiously, gives up female company coupled with bad intentions, as many of his predecessors have done, and is frank and sincere, he will have delivered a smashing blow to British snobbish respectability, cant and hypocrisy.

As an example of the British view of what constitutes high moral principles among the aristocracy, which includes the bishops (bishops have seats in the House of Lords) we read that a bishop says publicly that the king seems to be unaware of the fact that he needs the grace of God. This, in spite of the fact that nothing has been proven against him morally, criminally, socially or otherwise. No, nothing except that he is a social friend of a woman who recently got a divorce!

Can anything be more ridiculous, basely accusative and smugly snobbish!

**PORTLAND FOOTBALL

PORTLAND, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Increased prices offset a decline in attendance and Portland high school football teams wound up the 1936 season about \$2500 ahead of last year.

Figures compiled today by the Multnomah Stadium association, showed the schools drew 77,372 fans against 83,128 in 1935 but higher prices brought in \$25,711 against \$23,357 last year.

commonwealth as a whole and such change could not be effected without the assent of all the dominions.

"I am satisfied from inquiries I have made that this assent would not be forthcoming."
"I have felt it right to make this statement before the house adjourns today in order to remove a wide misunderstanding."

The thunderous applause after Baldwin said "his majesty's government are not prepared to introduce such legislation," left slight doubt in the minds of his hearers that he has parliament with him.

The instant Clement Attlee, labor leader who was obviously playing a pre-arranged part, said it would be undesirable to discuss the prime minister's statement, the chief government whip rose and moved the hurried adjournment.

Winston Churchill and Colonel Josiah Wedgwood, leaders of opposition parties, who might have wished to speak, were left with their mouths hanging open.

Premier Baldwin made his historic statement to a hushed and awed house.

The members sat motionless as he started to speak.

Baldwin leaned across the speaker's desk. His face, lined and drawn from the worry of the past few days, was gravely set.

Several cabinet ministers entered just as Baldwin began his statement but stopped and lined up behind the speaker's chair, where he was standing. Instead of proceeding to their usual seats.

The king's brief morning absence from Belvedere, where he got but four hours of fitful sleep during the night, gave rise to numerous rumors.

At first it was thought he might have raced to London, but later indications were that he conferred with his adjoining neighbor, Lord Derby, life-long friend of his father.

W. T. Monckton, K. C., attorney general to the Duchy of Cornwall, spent the night at Belvedere with the king's personal household.

Edward is believed to be leaning on him heavily for advice.

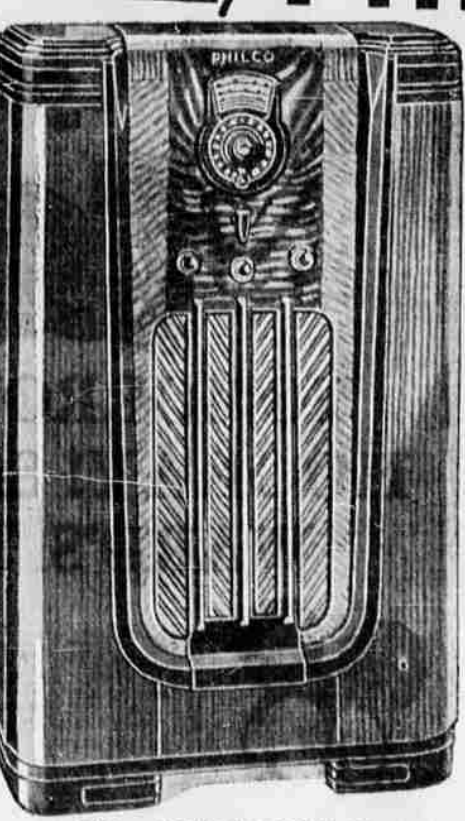
