Warrenton Levy Tops in Oregon
ASTORIA, Ore., Dec. 5.—(AP)—The city of Warrenton advances into the highest tax classification in the state next year as a result of county tax sales which took away thousands of dollars of assessed valuation there, a report of the county assessor showed today.
Warrenton taxpayers will remit on a basis determined by which diking district they reside in. Those in district one must pay a rate of 132.7 mills; district two, 130 mills; and district three, 133.5 mills.
The Astoria tax will be 74.8 mills, about three mills under 1935; Seaside, 89.3, a decline of more than two mills; and Gearhart, 84.4, an increase of more than two.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—(AP) Supporters rallied around John D. M. Hamilton today in an effort to keep him in the post of Republican national chairman, despite his offer to step out.

Hamilton, who managed the Landon campaign, announced he would offer his resignation to the party's national committee in Chicago December 17. His statement implied, however, that he would remain if given a vote of confidence.
Several national committeemen spoke out in favor of keeping Hamilton at the party helm, though some others reserved comment.
Vice-Chairman Ralph E. Williams at Portland, Ore., predicted Hamilton would be retained.
