COUNTY SPENDING WELL IN BUDGET

General county fund expenditures of Jackson county during March amounted to \$25,166.44, according to a monthly report today by the county clerk's office. This is 9.8 percent of the budget.

For the first quarter of the year, the budget expenditures total 23.9 percent, all departments being well within their budget allowances. Road fund expenditures for the first quarter amounted to \$21,691.63, or 17.8 percent for the quarter. Snow and winter damage caused an increase in the normal quarter spending.

The report shows that all relief expenditures are well within the budget and less than for the same period last year.
