

### P.-T. A. ADVISED TO AID DEANS IN ASSISTING GIRLS

#### Every Unit Should Have Committee to Back Work of Deans—Miss Basford Reports On Handicapped

PORTLAND, Ore., April 15.—(AP)—Dean Mary Yeat of Stanford university, a principal speaker at the Oregon congress of parents and teachers, urged a thorough study of the work accomplished by deans in assisting high school girls.

"Deans of girls must have plenty of time for their job," she said. "If they try to hurry at advice, they may do much harm. My main reason for being here to address you is to say that every parent-teacher unit ought to have a committee to study the work of the deans in the community. Deans need the backing of the parents and teachers and they need the support of the community."

The convention will close tonight. Thursday the congress elected Mrs. G. W. Walls of Portland president for the ensuing two-year term, succeeding Mrs. William Kietzer, also of Portland.

New sectional vice-presidents were: Mrs. F. W. Blum, Portland, headquarter; Mrs. James John, Jr., Pendleton, eastern; Mrs. Florah Schroeder, Condon, east central; Mrs. Otto Lance, Albany, west central; Mrs. Frank Pettison, Eugene, south central; Mrs. B. C. Forsythe, Ashland, southwest; Mrs. Robert Rose, Klamath Falls, southeast, and Mrs. Fred Smith, Multnomah county.

Mrs. Jane Goddard of Oswego was elected recording secretary and Mrs. E. E. Woodward of Portland treasurer.

Miss Louise Basford of Medford reported that 1031 physically handicapped children were reported by the school boards of the state, 45 per cent of whom were receiving instruction either at home or in special classes. The survey indicated an increasing awareness of the need for special instruction, she said.

Dr. Elam Anderson, president of Linfield college, said a restoration of respect for authority in the home was needed to root out lawlessness in the community.

A mechanical civilization has failed to provide a satisfactory substitute for the old fashioned home, he said.

### YOUNG BOURBONS GATHER IN BEND

NORTH BEND, April 15.—(AP)—Young Democrats of Oregon turned to North Bend today to hold their annual convention, elect officers and hear addresses from prominent members of the party in the northwest.

### PORTLAND WILL TRY FIVE CENT CAR FARE

PORTLAND, April 15.—(AP)—W. H. Lines, vice president of the Portland Traction company, authorized a 120-day experimental period for 5-cent fares on all West Side lines. The trial will start on July 1.

The move, discussed at yesterday's city council session, is designed to stimulate traffic. The regular fare is 10 cents.

### NEW ENROLLEES ARRIVE TO FILL CCC COMPANIES

Replacements are arriving in the Medford CCC district to bring to full strength the camps which dropped in enrollment when members returned home at the end of their enrollment period in March.

Last of three special trains from Texas will arrive tonight with 31 men for Camp Prescott, 103 for Camp South Fork, 101 for Camp Rand and 50 for Oregon Caves. Lieut. Fletcher L. Dannelly is in command.

Two Texas trains arrived in the district yesterday. One arrived last night at Klamath Falls with 70 men for Camp Tule Lake, 72 for Silver Lake and 111 for Lava Beds. Lieut. C. L. Stahler was in command. The other arrived yesterday morning at Roseburg with 108 men for Sitkum and 80 for McKinley. Lieut. H. R. Hays was in command.

Seventh corps area replacements arrived April 7 from Port Leavenworth. The list included 72 men for Camp Clear Lake, 72 for Applegate, 54 for Wimer, 51 for Gasquet and 52 for Steamboat.

Fifty-five men from the first corps area arrived April 10 for Camp Brice Creek, a Massachusetts company. Fifth corps replacements for Camp Prairie Creek, Camp Bonanza, Camp Klamath and Camp Agnesa will arrive about April 20.

### NEUTRALITY ADVOCATE TO BE MAIN SPEAKER AT PEACE MEET HERE

Plans were being made today for the accommodation of a large audience in the First Christian church next Wednesday evening when a public meeting will be held to carry out the 1937 phase of the Emergency Peace Campaign.

All local organizations interested in the promotion of world peace have been invited to attend the meeting which will open at 8 o'clock. It was stated by the Rev. James Hamilton, pastor of the First Christian church and Medford chairman of the campaign. The Rev. Mr. Hamilton is being assisted by the Rev. Oscar G. Gibson, pastor of the Main Street Methodist church, South.

Principal speaker will be Ray McKaig, legislative chairman of the Idaho State Orange with headquarters in Boise. Mr. McKaig is considered well qualified for his task as he has long been a student of war causes and an advocate of effective neutrality measures.

After the outbreak of the world war and prior to the entrance of the United States in 1917, Mr. McKaig

made a study of neutrality and of the events which finally led this country into the conflict, the Rev. Mr. Hamilton said. He strongly opposed violation of neutrality measures at that time and since then has continued his campaign for a strong and permanent neutrality policy, the pastor stated.

### NOTED MUSICAL GROUP 'WHITE HUSSARS' WILL APPEAR HERE TUESDAY

In addition to previously announced entertainment features for Pear Blossom week will be the appearance of Herbert Peirce and his White Hussars, musical group, to be presented Tuesday night at 8:30 o'clock in the senior high school auditorium.

The instrumental group is being sponsored by the high school, and the program is to follow the 30th Infantry band concert which has been set for 7 p. m. in order that citizens may attend both events.

The five artists appearing in the troupe play 11 different instruments in solo ensemble. Their repertoire includes opera selections, marches and modern and classical melodies. Herbert Peirce, director, studied at the American Conservatory of Music and has been solo cornetist in the famous Naval Battalion band, directed by John Philip Sousa.

The musicians will appear in colorful costumes. The entire infantry band will be invited to attend the high school presentation following the army concert.
