

V. F. W. POPPY SALE FOR RELIEF FUND SLATED MAY 21-22

Because of the nation-wide contribution of approximately 3,600 local posts of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States to flood relief funds of the Red Cross, the organization has been financially depleted. The sale of the V.F.W. Poppy sale is imperative that the 1937 Buddy Poppy sale of the organization be greater than ever before.

This was the message conveyed to Chaplain Karl Knutson, chairman of the local Buddy Poppy sale by Adjutant General R. B. Handy, Jr., Kansas City, Mo.

Although Buddy Poppy proceeds for the last 15 years, were devoted exclusively to relief of disabled veterans and their dependents and widows and orphans of veterans, a special ruling January 25 released this money to the flood relief work of the Red Cross, Commander Etha W. Wall said today.

"The money V.F.W. posts gave to flood relief work was in addition to the tons of food, clothing, medical necessities and other supplies that these units contributed to flood victims. In cooperation with the Red Cross and other relief agencies," Wall said, "Many of our posts themselves were in the flooded areas. Many lost their club headquarters in the disaster but participated virtually 100 percent in working day and night administering relief and caring for refugees."

With their funds depleted, the Buddy Poppy sale offers the only opportunity of the past 12 months for obtaining funds necessary to carry on the work among America's disabled veterans and their families. Entire proceeds of the drive here, as elsewhere, will be devoted to this service and rehabilitation work. A portion goes to the V.F.W. national home for war orphans at Elton, Pa. The other portion goes to the V.F.W. national service bureau at Washington, D. C., and the remainder to disabled and needy veterans here, Commander Wall explained.

The Buddy Poppy sale here will be conducted May 21 and 22. It is the one occasion of the year when the American public is asked to share with the V.F.W. in care of disabled veterans and the widows and orphans of veterans, Commander Wall said.

DETECTIVE ADDRESSES SECOND POLICE CLASS ON TRACING OF CRIME

The second weekly police school sponsored by the Medford City and County and the University of Oregon, was held in the Medford city hall council chambers Wednesday afternoon with a fair attendance of law enforcement officers of southern Oregon turning out.

Principal speaker was Detective Orville Williams of the Portland bureau of police. He gave a highly interesting talk on "Criminal Investigation," pointing out the most modern methods of investigating crimes, the correct procedure and the value of cooperation between the departments of different cities.

The third police school will be held next Wednesday, according to Chief of Police C. J. MacCreddie, chairman. Frank Van Dyke, Ashland city attorney, will be the featured speaker. He will talk on city ordinances and their relation to police work of all kinds.

New "students" attending the school Wednesday were C. L. Pierce, Medford COG inspector; W. P. Dunn, assistant chief of police of Ashland; Evan F. Martin, state inspector of livestock thefts, and Clyde D. Fiske of the state police.

Other officers attending were Joe Cave, Walter J. Belknap, C. J. Moser, Clyde C. Pichtner and Chief MacCreddie, all of Medford; B. F. Graybill, Ken Williams and C. M. Dallas of Grants Pass; Floyd Clark of Ashland and E. W. Hodgkith, chief of police of Central Point.

PATROLMAN HOXIE TO SERVE AT COQUILLE

ROSEBURG, Ore., April 15.—(AP)—State Police Patrolman Hubert Hoxie, stationed at Roseburg for the past five years, is being transferred to Coquille, where he will be in charge of the state owned radio station used by the highway department and state police. It was announced today. He will take over his new duties Sunday. Patrolman Roy O'Mara of Portland is expected to fill the place made vacant by the transfer of Hoxie.

It also was reported that an additional patrolman and a radio operator will be assigned to Roseburg in the near future, to serve during the summer season, but no definite announcement has yet been made, according to Corporal Paul Parsons, who is in charge of the Roseburg district.

Klamath Sees Need More School Room

KLAMATH FALLS, April 15.—(AP)—The Klamath Union high school board favors a construction program to relieve a class room shortage and complete a physical education plant. Percy Murray, chairman, said today. A bond issue will be necessary to finance the work. Murray said the enrollment of 1,000 students is already more than the capacity for the 1937-38 year and the situation will be more serious next year.

JUDITH ALLEN IS GRANTED DIVORCE

LOS ANGELES, April 15.—(AP)—Granting film actress Judith Allen a divorce today, Superior Judge Charles S. Bunnell told her she was entitled to annulment, instead, of her Mexican marriage to Joseph "Jack" Doyle, actor-boxer, despite the fact that Superior Judge Joseph Vickers denied her plea two weeks ago.

Judge Bunnell heard Miss Allen's testimony about the couple's marriage in Agua Caliente in April, 1935, and her charges of cruelty, and said: "I'm afraid, young lady, you are no more married to this man than I am."

Her lawyer, Samuel Zagon, hastened to explain that Judge Vickers denied her annulment plea although she testified at the time she and Doyle did not comply with Mexican marriage laws as to witnesses and other matters. "Well, he probably doesn't know much about the laws of Mexico," Judge Bunnell observed.

The new instructors will take the place of four present teachers who submitted resignations, including Beatrice Lockhart, Ruth Billings, Florence Hoagland, and Ida Gunter. All gave marriage as their reason for resigning, according to Superintendent George A. Briscoe. The new staff members include:
