DOG SAVES BOY FROM ASH PIT



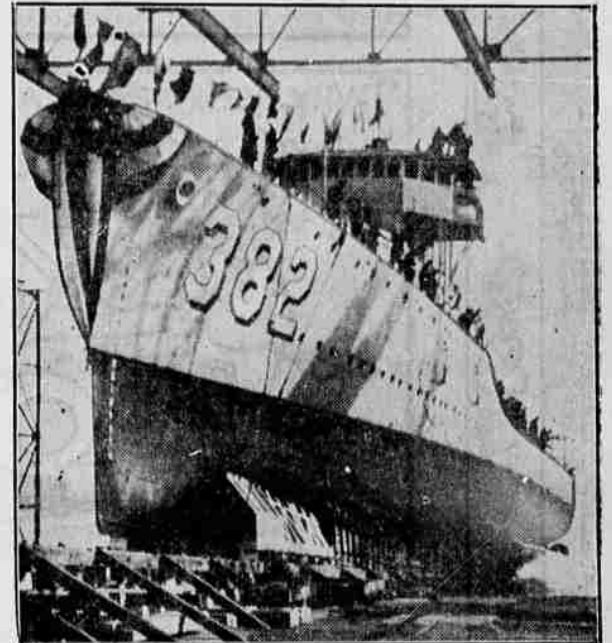

NAVY DESTROYER LAUNCHED



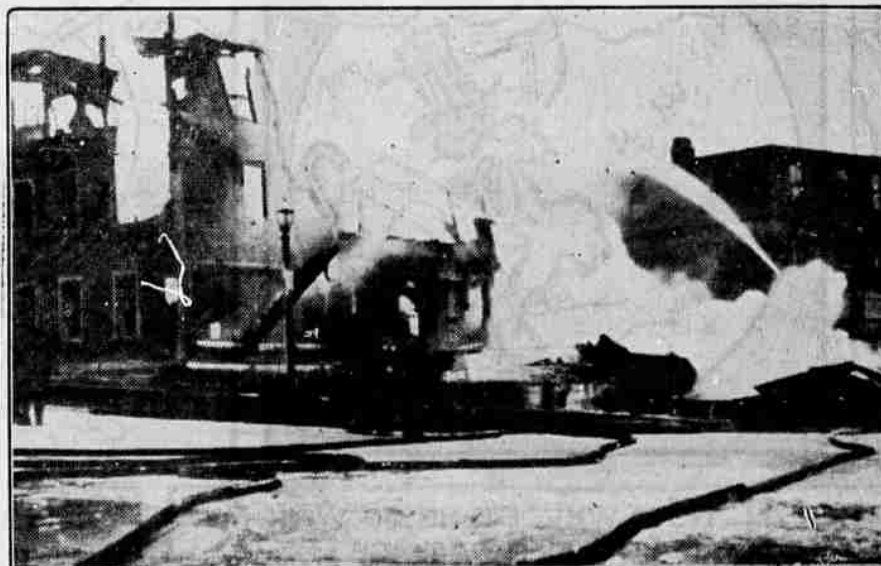

'HOW'S THE ARM, HANK?'



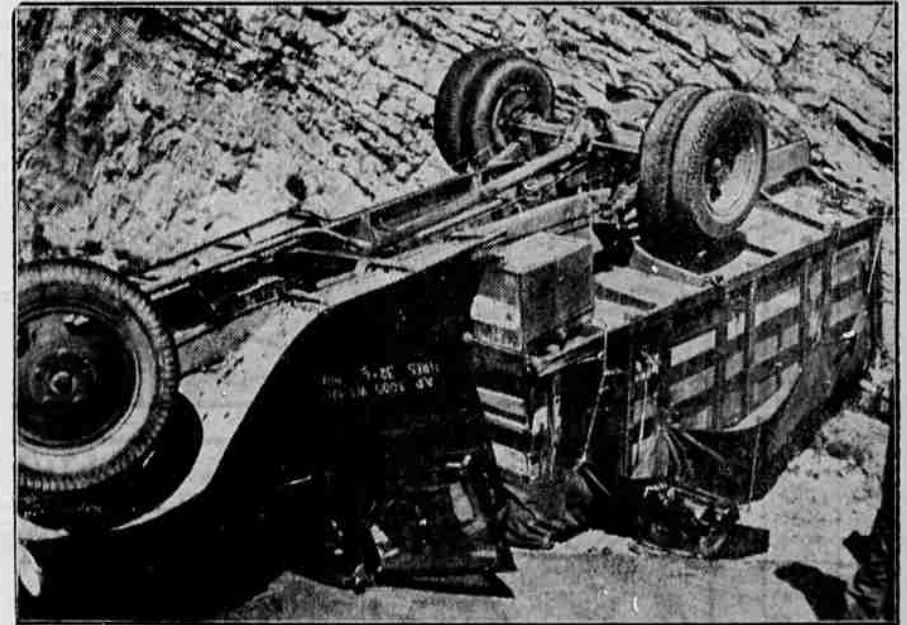
