Chinese Art Is Subject of Talk At Study Group

Chinese art was the subject of a paper presented by Miss Elizabeth Burr at the April meeting of the Travel Study club. Mrs. R. B. Johnson was hostess for the affair at her home on Keene Way Monday afternoon.

Ancient records show the arts to be a true medium of expression of the Chinese people, Miss Burr related. A history of their development is found in their work dating as far back as 6000 B. C., she pointed out.

Miss Burr stated that teachings of Buddha and Confucius often form the subjects of arts, as well as incidents of family life and symbolic detail, such as the lotus and dragon. Remarkable craftsmanship is shown in delicate carving of wood, stone, ivory and jade, and embroidering of textiles and painting on silk are found among the earliest work, as are also the making of pottery and porcelain, Miss Burr said.

Work with bronze, brass and lacquer is typically Chinese, according to the speaker.

"The House of Xile" by Nora Wain was reviewed by Mrs. R. H. Paxson, who pointed out that the author lived for many years as an adopted daughter of an aristocratic Chinese family. The book, Mrs. Paxson said, is the story of the life of the Lin family who have been established in the family home through 35 generations and is a revelation of information on the Chinese manner of living.
