30TH INFANTRY ENROUTE NORTH; HERE TOMORROW

The detachment will be open for inspection during the late afternoon and evening. At 3:30 o'clock, a baseball game will start between the crack 30th infantry nine and the Medford town team of the Southern Oregon league. The game will be free to the public and will be played on the fairgrounds diamond.

At 7 o'clock in the evening the 75-piece band, pride of the 30th infantry, will present a free public concert in the city park. Fred Schreffel, city engineer, is constructing a special band stand which will be decorated with pear blossoms in keeping with the "Blossom Week" festivities.

At 8:30 o'clock band members will be guests of the Medford high school at a performance of the White Hussars, world famous musicians and entertainers, who are being presented one night only in Medford under the auspices of the high school band.

The band concert will be concluded in plenty of time for all who wish to attend the White Hussars performance which offers a rare musical treat.

At 9 o'clock, the Eagles' "May Day" dance honoring the men of the 30th infantry, will open at the Oriental Gardens. The general public has been invited and the affair should be one of the big dances of the year.

Officers of the regiment will be guests of the Officers club of the Medford CCC district at an informal dance at the Hotel Medford.

Major G. R. Owens, commander of the Medford CCC district, is in charge of local arrangements, at the invitation of Colonel Phillipson, regimental commander.

The regiment is en route to Fort Lewis for maneuvers which will concentrate the entire third division for the first time since the world war, and which will bring together the 38th infantry from Fort Douglas, Utah; the 7th infantry from Vancouver Barracks; the 4th infantry from Fort George Wright, Wash.; the 30th infantry from the Presidio of San Francisco; the 9th and 10th field artilleries from Fort Lewis, and other units.
