

COTA CASE NEARS WINDUP IN COURT

Trial of the damage suit of Joseph Cota against O. L. Lindley and H. Van Hovenberg, continued today in circuit court and is expected to be concluded late today or early tomorrow morning.

Cota seeks \$1,550 alleged damages as the result of an auto crash last summer on the Sams Valley road, between the Cota auto and a Van Hovenberg truck driven by Lindley.

A companion suit, filed by Mrs. Josephine Cota, seeks \$4,000 for alleged personal injuries, sustained in

accident. It is set for next Friday.

Damage suit of Jeanne R. Wood against H. E. Miller, practitioner, and his assistant, Louise Bates, for personal injury is scheduled to start upon completion of the present suit.

Fields, in a statement, admits he shot Mow as the climax of a triangle love affair involving Fields' estranged wife. Fields claims he shot in self-defense. The shooting occurred in the home of Fields' wife in Jacksonville.
