NEW YORK, April 20 (AP)—A highly favorable earnings statement and prospects of further industrial improvement stimulated a selective and quiet rally in today's stock market. Led by steels and rails, favored farm implements, aircrafts, rubbers and specialties pushed up fractions to 2 or more points, although late profit selling cut down extreme gains in many instances. Losers were plentiful at the close. The president's message to congress requesting \$1,500,000,000 for the relief budget was in line with forecasts and brokers thought it had little influence either way on stocks. The suggestion new taxes were possible in the next session had also been considered in the financial district. U. S. government securities skidded as the chief executive disclosed a budgeted but anticipated deficit in the fiscal period ending June 30. Corporation bonds improved. Commodities displayed uneven trends. Stock dealings were rather lively in the first hour. The pace slowed subsequently. Transfers were around 1,100,000 shares.
