April 22 and set bail of \$2,000 each. This was immediately protested by Benjamin J. Arena, Maine C. I. O. counsel.

Arena declared the bail "excessive" on the grounds the alleged act constituted a misdemeanor.
"Under ordinary conditions it is," said Judge Pulsifer, "but not now. I think the time has come when there must be a discontinuance of leniency. While this situation continues, persons brought before this court will be given the limit."

Ready for Trouble
This statement following the earlier declaration of Governor Lewis O. Barrows, ordering the troops out, that:
"If necessary I am prepared to order out the entire military forces of Maine to preserve constitutional authority."
Today's action followed on the heels of an injunction by Judge Harry Manser outlawing the strike and granting a temporary injunction against the strikers, and C. I. O. reports that the court ruling was a "miscarriage of justice" that "meant nothing."

COTA AWARDED \$250 DAMAGE IN SMASHUP

A circuit court yesterday returned a verdict in favor of John B. Cota against O. L. Lindley and J. Van Hovenberg, for damages arising from an auto accident in the Sams Valley road last summer. Cota was awarded \$250. He sought \$1,625. Lindley was the driver of the car belonging to Van Hovenberg, a Gold Hill district orchardist.

Trial of the case, expected to take two days, lasted close to three. Cota was represented by Attorney Don R. Newbury, the defendants by Attorney Charles W. Beames. The jury deliberated about an hour.

A companion suit of Mrs. Josephine Cota, for \$4,000 for alleged personal injuries, has been set for early trial.

SENATOR LOGAN MAY BACK COMPROMISE IN COURT CHANGE BILL

WASHINGTON, April 22.—(AP)—Senator Logan (D., Ky.), one of the first members of the senate judiciary committee to back the Roosevelt court bill, said today he might vote to compromise on two new justices.

Even without Logan's vote, little doubt remained that opponents of the bill could modify it from a six to a two judge measure if they chose. Only a minority on the committee was ready to support it without reservation.

Logan was the fifth among the 18 committee members to speak sympathetically of the two-justice proposal.

Discussing the situation informally, he said he favored reporting the six judge bill and also the Burke constitutional amendment for retirement of judges at 75. He added, however, that he looked "with some degree of favor" on the compromise of two justices.

Most of the opponents favored rejecting compromise amendments in order to force showdown on the president's bill as submitted.

The seventh week of hearings dragged slowly toward a close today with further opposition testimony from Dean L. J. Toppel of Creighton law school, Omaha.

Opponents will close their case tomorrow and the hearings will end unless the friends of the bill decide to present brief rebuttal testimony next week.
