County Teachers Chorus Formed Five Years Ago

Mrs. James Hoey Named New Head Of County Unit

Mrs. James K. Hoey of this city was elected president of the Jackson county Parent-Teacher association at yesterday's meeting in Central Point.

Other new officers named with Mrs. Hoey are: Mrs. C. D. Ehart, Ashland, vice-president; Mrs. W. J. Gehard, Central Point, secretary; and Mrs. Nell Dunn of Bellview, treasurer.

A large number of representatives of units throughout the county were present for the session, which opened at 10 a. m. with Mrs. B. C. Forsythe of Ashland presiding. Business included reports on progress and activities of each unit in the county.

Following luncheon served by the Central Point unit as hostess, songs by fifth and sixth grade pupils of the city opened the afternoon meeting. Delegates to the recent state convention in Portland reported on convention features, the reports being arranged as a short dramatic presentation.

Mrs. Jack Heyland of Medford installed new officers to conclude the session.

In the fall of 1932 a little group of teachers met in Medford and decided to form a choral club. There were eight teachers at the meeting and Mrs. George Andrews, a well known musician of southern Oregon. With the idea of singing together for pleasure and professional improvement in school music, they formed a self-supporting group which was developed under the leadership of Harriet Baldwin, music supervisor of Medford schools, into a fine ensemble singing group of thirty-two members.

Since that year the choral club has continued to grow. It has reached outside the teaching profession and many who are not teachers, but who enjoy singing and are interested in good music, have joined the club.

Two years ago the chorus began the building up of a music library and this has been added to until there is a worth-while collection on file in the office of the county superintendent for use of the chorus.

The group, supported by the county superintendent's office and the Medford school music department, has been organized for five years. This year it has reached a maximum

of sixty-four members. They have made a number of public appearances during the past season, notably at Portland last June at the N. E. A. convention, where they won the approval of national leaders.

Ether Leake, music director for past three years, assisted by Mary Chambers, accompanist for two years, is in charge of the annual concert which is to be given Monday evening, April 26th, at the high school auditorium at 8:15 o'clock. A concert at Ashland May 2, at the Southern Oregon Normal school under the auspices of the A. A. U. W., will end this season for the chorus.
