COMMUNISTS USE DEVIOUS TACTICS IS WORD TO D. A. R.

National Defense Chairman Tells Delegates Reds Are Using Farmer-Labor Party to Bore From Within

WASHINGTON, April 23. — (AP) — Daughters of the American Revolution heard the Farmer-Labor and Communist parties linked today in an address by Mrs. Vinton E. Sisson of Chicago, national defense chairman.

Discussing the growth of the Farmer-Labor movement, Mrs. Sisson's prepared speech said: "Through the medium of this so-called American party, the Communist party bores from within to accomplish its purpose."

That method, she said, is "far more dangerous to the welfare of this country than the open flaunting of the revolutionary purpose which for the present they choose to conceal."

Would Bar Party. Mrs. Sisson advised the D. A. R.'s to work to have the Communist party "declared by law an illegal party with no right to protection under our constitutional form of government."

She promised the support of her committee for continuance of compulsory military training in colleges and universities.

"The Daughters of the American Revolution consider the R. O. T. C. as a real peace agency," she said. Mrs. Sisson criticized "so-called peace groups" who support "repudiation of the Oriental exclusion act, elimination of the use of armed force in industrial disputes, repeal of teachers' oath laws and discretionary immigration powers."

"These would not bring about peace," she declared. "They would bring only chaos and internal disorder in the United States. Yet \$1,000,000 is asked of the American people to put over these and other measures in the name of peace."

Guard-men Save Strife. "What, one wonders, might have happened had the national guard not been allowed on the scene during recent industrial disturbances—preventing order without bloodshed by their very presence."

Judge John J. Parker of Charlotte, N. C., once rejected by the senate for the supreme court seat now held by Justice Cardozo, said in a prepared speech that "democracy is in greater danger than it has been at any time since the fall of Napoleon."

He urged the retention of individual states' rights, but expressed the belief that the federal government must be given a greater measure of control over matters affecting the national welfare "either by revising our concept of the power possessed by the federal government, under the commerce clause of the constitution or by amendment of the constitution."

Commend F. R. The D. A. R. passed unanimously a resolution commending President Roosevelt and Secretary Hull for their efforts toward establishing amicable relations in the western hemisphere. Another resolution urged continuance of the civilian conservation corps on a permanent basis.

Delegates commended the federal bureau of investigation for its prompt support of a cancer education program and urged extension of immigration restriction quotas to countries of the western hemisphere.

F. R. ASSURES MARTIN ON BONNEVILLE PLANS PORTLAND, April 23. — (AP) — The Oregonian, in a special dispatch from Washington, said President Roosevelt had assured Governor Charles Martin that the Bonneville dam project would not be "hamstrung," and that its fullest benefits will be safeguarded.

The governor, the dispatch said, visited the White House for the purpose of telling the president that "Bonneville is your baby and you must take care of it."

"The advantages of the project must be reflected in the rates after the write-off for navigation," Martin said.

Everyday Cooking Miracles

A perfectly normal man indulging in the "heat" of a freshly-baked loaf of bread presents a comely picture, but modern homemakers might find it a study untrue to life, if the new Hotpoint electric range hadn't brought bread-making up-to-date and simplified it. Simplified it to such a degree that it can point

hot liquid and cool. Liquid should be 110° when used. Dissolve yeast in 6 tablespoons water with sugar. Divide the flour into thirds, reserving 1 or 2 cups. Pour cool liquid into mixer bowl. Add 1/2 of flour and beat 5 minutes with the mixer on HIGH speed. Add 1/2 more of flour and beat 5 minutes. Then pro-

ceed at SLOW speed, mixing the last 1/2 of flour. Knead the last cup of flour into the dough. Mold, using a pulling motion until bread looks smooth. About 10 minutes will give right texture. Shape into three loaves, divided or single, as desired. Place in greased bread pans.

In Cold Oven Then place your loaves of bread in a cold oven. Turn oven switch on for exactly one minute. Set the automatic temperature control to 400°. Turn switch for baking and set the automatic timer, or chef's brain, to turn heat on 30 minutes later, and to turn heat off 1 hour from time heat is turned on. The 30 minutes interval before the heat is turned on permits the bread to rise without requiring any attention. During this interval, the temperature in the electric oven makes an ideal proofing box—not too hot, not too cold.

That's all there is to it. Simple, isn't it? Three evenly browned loaves of bread waiting to be taken from the oven—what a flavorsome treat for the family!

Bring milk and water to boiling point on surface unit of electric range switched to HIGH. Remove from unit and add salt and fat to

with pride to perfect loaves of bread that take only 30 minutes, not to bake, but to make, from start to finish.

Seems miraculous, doesn't it? Well, it is. But it's the kind of miracle that works every time, whether the homemaker is an experienced cook, or not.

The first trick in this new method of bread-making is the use of the electric mixer. This takes all the drudgery out of bread-mixing, making it just as easy as mixing a cake. Here are the ingredients:

- 2 cups milk 6 tablespoons salt 1 1/2 cups water warm water 1 1/2 tablespoons 4 cakes compressed yeast 4 tablespoons shortening 12-14 cups general purpose flour sugar

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APOSTOLIC FAITH EVANGELS OPENING PROGRAM TONIGHT

The Apostolic Faith will open an evangelistic campaign at their local church, 42 North Front street this evening. Evangelists Ray R. Crawford, overseer, and B. J. Robinson, from Portland headquarters, with a company of workers and singers will be in charge.

There has been a manifold interest in the meetings locally and a decided increase in attendance during the past months and it is expected that this campaign will exceed any held heretofore in Medford.

D. L. Myers and George Seeley, ministers in charge locally, are optimistic concerning the work in this district and feel that a greater interest is being manifested in religious activities in recent months than for years past.

The Apostolic Faith is a very aggressive and progressive organization, extending their activities into every available field. They visit hospitals, sanitariums, homes for the aged, jails, prisons and penitentiaries, holding meetings and doing personal work among inmates and shut-ins.

Gratifying work has been carried on among seafaring men in Portland harbor for a number of years. Foreign and domestic vessels are visited in port by missionaries and personal workers, and Gospel literature is presented officers and crew personally aboard ship.

The local Apostolic Faith church is growing rapidly. The various musical organizations in the work are putting forth special effort and preparing special music for this campaign. The orchestra of 20 pieces will lead congregational singing and present special concert numbers Sunday evening. The male and mixed quartets and choruses will also have special selections. The new Hammond electric organ is one of the outstanding instruments of modern times. While it is portable and quickly installed, it has a tone very similar in quality and volume to a massive pipe organ. A feature distinctly different from most revival campaigns is the fact that no collections are taken. In over

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Quick Fudge Suggested for Cake Icing

The latest wrinkle in cake making is not to bake the cake but to buy it at the bakery and apply your own icing to give it that desirable home-made touch. This has recently been made quite easy and certain very smart by the introduction of a new preparation called Quick Fudge Mix.

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OREGON JOURNAL SUE FOR ATTACKING BRIDGES

PORTLAND, April 23.—(AP)—Harry L. Gross, attorney for Harry Bridges, president of the Pacific Coast International Longshoremen's association, filed a \$100,000 libel action against the Journal Publishing company in circuit court today.

Bridges asks \$50,000 special damages and \$50,000 punitive damages. He alleged a Journal editorial on January 7 referred to him as "an alien provocateur of revolution who came to this country to stir up strife" and as an "undesirable alien" and a "false friend of unionism."

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CARNIVAL FOLLOWER IS SHOT AS BURGLAR

EVERETT, Wash., April 23.—(AP)—Albert Crowe, 19, of Salem, Ore., who came to Everett with a carnival now playing here, was shot in the left thigh by Police Officer George Thompson early this morning. He is recuperating at an Everett hospital.

Thompson, who was off duty at the time, states that he was awakened by a prowler endeavoring to break into his home. Gun in hand the officer rushed out. The intruder ran, the officer opened fire three times. On the third shot the fleeing man fell but got up and ran again.

A short time later, from a residence three blocks from the scene of the shooting, police officers received a call from a woman who informed them that someone was on her back porch calling for help. There the officers found Crowe, wounded in the leg.
