DI MAGGIO TRIO

Headed by Joe; Brothers Coming. Elder Vince and Younger Dominic Are Following in Footsteps of Brother—Tom Now Out of Baseball.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

By Sam Jackson (AP Feature Service Writer) SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Three ball-players answer to the name of Di Maggio this season.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Fans who think of "Di Mag" as the sensational Yankee outfielder named Joe will have to remember that Big Brother Vince is also in the majors—a rookie with the Boston Bees.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Out here on the coast, bespectacled Dominic is getting his first crack at the professional game with the San Francisco Seals.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Vince is 24, Joe 22, Dominic 19. There's another Di Maggio boy, Tom, now following his father's pursuit of crab fishing, who might have been the greatest ball-player of all the Di Maggios.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Vince Persuades O'Doul "Tom was a swell player in his semi-pro days," says Dominic. "He got a tryout with the Seals about 1928. I have a feeling he'd be the best of us all if he hadn't got a cold that crippled his arm."

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Now around 30, Tom has given up baseball. Vincent launched the family into ball-playing as a profession. It was he who induced Lefty O'Doul of the Seals to give Joe a tryout. Joe made good in a big way, but Vince was released soon afterward and finished the 1933 season with the Hollywood club.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Originally a third-baseman, Vince was spotted by the Seals playing semi-pro ball in San Francisco and sent to their farm—the Tucson club of the Arizona league. The league folded in the middle of the 1931 season, and Vince and three other players—their salary a month in arrears—got a welcome call back to San Francisco.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Ups and downs followed until last season. In the outfield for the San Diego club, Vince batted .293 in 176 games. The bid to the Bees' training camp at St. Petersburg, Fla., followed. Boston played Vince at third in pre-season games, but he'll probably stay in the outfield.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Four-year-old Dominic Young graduated in 1934 from Galilee high school, San Francisco, an institution which has turned out a number of stellar Italian athletes. Keen on ball-playing, he worked spasmodically in factories while he batted "on out for various teams in the North Beach district. He got his chance last season with the Fresno of Monterey team in the Mission semi-pro league, which has the reputation of playing pretty good ball.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Domino used to be a shortstop, now plays outfield. If his thick lenses bother him in either batting or fielding he doesn't bother it. Associates say he does no better or worse than any promising rookie with the correct optics.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Domino related for the first time how brother Joe made good in a big way in his first opportunity to get on a real ball club. Vince's arguments got him into a ball game for the Seals the very last day of the 1932 season. Joe lined out a single and a triple. His berth at next spring's training camp was assured.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

The ball-playing Di Maggios have four sisters, all married. Regular business was attended to and good reports from the different committees given.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Our officers put on the third and fourth degree for a series of times. There were four candidates from Evans Valley and two from our Grange. Our other two candidates did not show up. Six committees reported Brother Wilbur Martin improving. There was no lecture hour due to degree work.

DI MAGGIO TRIO

Several visitors gave talks which were enjoyed by all. The losing side on the sales slip contest served and washed the dishes. We have won several \$1.50 and \$2.50 prizes in the sales slip contest.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

COMEBACK CITED AS OUTPUT GAINS. Improved Timber Policies, Permanency of Business Noted by Association—Wage Value Is Stressed.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

WASHINGTON.—(UP)—Lumber production in the United States, which decreased during the depression to less than one-fourth of its peak, has recovered to more than one-half of the top output of about 40,000,000,000 feet annually between 1908 and 1910.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

The National Lumber Manufacturers' association announced that the forest products industry, embracing lumbering and wood manufacturers, can use an anticipated output of between 25 and 30 billion feet a year—the amount which it is estimated can be cut without reducing the present supply of standing timber.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

"Under improved forest management policies," the association reported, "the lumber industry is not a declining industry; it is permanent and is based upon a perpetual timber crop reproduction."

LUMBER INDUSTRY

Production was 37,000,000,000 feet in 1929, but declined rapidly to 10,000,000,000 in 1932, bottom year of the depression. Since then, production has almost doubled.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

Fourth in general industrial groups classified by the census in 1929 in point of employment, the forest products led all others in the number of industrial wage earners in 1936 in Oregon, Washington, Mississippi, Idaho, Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico and Arizona.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

The industry employed nearly 900,000 workers in 1929, paying in wages an amount exceeded only by four other general industrial groups. Between 1923 and 1929 it paid in wages annually an average of \$1,000,000,000.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

As Enumerated. Facts about the uses of wood as listed by the lumber manufacturers association: About 60 percent of all homes built each year are at least lumber-famed.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

Boxes and crates take 18 percent of the total lumber output. About 88 percent of all caskets are of wood.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

More than 1,200,000,000 board feet were made into furniture in 1928, about 675,000,000 in 1933. More than 1,000,000,000 feet went into railroad car manufacture and repair in 1928, about one-third that amount in 1933.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

NEW ORLEANS (UP)—The discovery of a hitherto unknown Mayan city in the dense jungles of the Peten forest in northern Guatemala was reported here by an expedition of the department of middle American research of Tulane university.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

Archaeologist Frans Blom led the expedition. He was accompanied by Dr. Sylvanus Griswold Morley of the Carnegie Institution in Washington. Dr. Morley made part of the trip by airplane, but became ill at Flores, capital of the Peten province. Blom led the party overland from there into the dense jungle.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

The expedition reported finding hundreds of mounds and temples which have never been recorded. Blom said that the Tulane department has the only official index of Maya ruins, where for years, explorers have been registering their finds. The city and many of the ruins are not listed in this record.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

RATS ARE KEPT FAT ON BREWERS' YEAST. MILWAUKEE (UP)—Several hundred rats kept in a brewery laboratory here suffer from hangovers when yeast is eliminated from their diets, company officials revealed.

LUMBER INDUSTRY

The rats are used to test the vitamin content of brewer's yeast, which is one of the sources of vitamins B and C. The brewery sells its yeast to pharmaceutical houses which incorporate it in medical preparations. When deprived of either vitamin B or C the rats lose their appetites, and within a year until they die unless they are fed yeast. Placed on a brewer's yeast diet the rats are weighed daily and the weight gain in 28 days is used in a mathematical formula to determine the vitamin content of the yeast batch.
