

# POMP AND POWER OF BRITISH ARMY TO BE DISPLAYED

Coronation Tattoo In June at Aldershot Is Planned As Great Pageant—To Demonstrate Allegiance.

LONDON (UP)—The British army will present at Aldershot next June the greatest military pageant ever

staged—the coronation tattoo proclaiming allegiance to and affection for the new king. Incidentally, military authorities confidently hope that this last word in flag-waving will give needed stimulation to recruiting. The tattoo is an annual affair to benefit army charities. Last year more than 3,000 troops in military uniforms of all the ages performed before 485,500 spectators. This year, in honor of the coronation, the tattoo will be on a much more elaborate scale and already advance sale of tickets is more than double this time last year. Special Music Written. Typical of the gigantic spectacle planned will be one number in which a military band of more than 1,000 musicians will play music written especially for the occasion. A modern battle, involving the ex-

tensive use of mechanized units, will show Britons their army in action. For comparison, another unit will portray the soldiers of Charles I, demonstrating the drills and tactics of that ancient day. Soldier-actors will re-enact the "Passage of the Douro," a stirring incident of the Peninsular war. Cavalry and infantry massed bands will march and wheel, playing entirely from memory the special, intricate tattoo music. The banners of the dominions, colonies and states of the empire will parade and assemble in salute to the Union Jack. "Keep Fit" to Be Stressed. A physical training display will be included as the army's contribution to the national "keep fit" campaign. Highlanders will swing their plaid kilts and lift bare knees behind massed bands of bagpipes. Evolutions

with lanterns will provide novel lighting effects of beauty. The finale will be a royal pageant on a grand scale, introducing the banera and royal bodyguards of the kings and queens of England since William I. Grandstands seating 80,000 persons have been built around the huge arena. Eight performances will be held, on June 10, 11, 12 and 15-19 inclusive. Another military spectacle among coronation pageants will be the celebration by the honorable artillery company of London of that organization's 400th birthday. On May 27 its infantry battalion and batteries will march past the king at Olympia as the opening event of a series of anniversary celebrations. American visitors are expected to be especially interested in the spectacle as the honorable artillery com-

## BOY SCOUT CAMP SITES APPROVED

WASHINGTON (Sp)—The construction layout of the 350-acre tent by congress to the Boy Scouts for their national jamboree here June 30 to July 9 has been approved by Secretary of the Interior Ickes and Arno B. Cammerer, director of

the national park service. The plans were prepared by Harvey A. Gordon, Boy Scout national director of engineering in charge of preparing the 30 or more sectional camps. The sites authorized for use by the jamboree contingents include part of the Washington monument grounds, West Potomac park south of the reflecting pool of the Lincoln memorial, old cricket grounds near the tourist camp, part of East Potomac park, nearly all of Columbia island, part of the department of agriculture's experimental farm, the area between the railroad and highway bridges along the Mt. ## HIGH INTEREST RATES PAID ON SMALL LOANS ARE BARED BY PROBE

ST. LOUIS (UP)—Evidence as to the manner in which small-loan sharks exacted as much as 1020 percent per year on salary assignments was presented before the St. Louis Bar association's committee investigating evasion of interest charges on small loans fixed by statute. A negro, who borrowed \$10 each week from a "salary buyer," testified that he had repaid \$11 each week following, thus paying inter-

est at the rate of 10 percent a week or 520 percent a year. The negro said he had continued this practice until he had borrowed \$80 and repaid \$88. When the payment on his next \$10 loan became delinquent, he was sued for the principal plus the 10 percent interest charge. Many of the cases heard, according to R. F. Buckley, involved minors and persons unfamiliar with the procedure in making loans who continued to pay exorbitant interest rates without even knowing the provisions of the contract under which the money had been borrowed. Buckley pointed out that in most cases the borrower never saw the contract, but only a slip with his own signature. Another case heard was that of a man who borrowed \$51 and repaid \$45, yet received credit for paying only \$3 and was sued for the alleged unpaid balance of \$48.
