China, Sculpture Form Discussion For Study Club

A feature of the program at this week's meeting of the Thursday Morning Study club was a paper on "Modern Women Sculptors," presented by Mrs. F. H. Reum.

Mrs. Reum gave biographies and examples of works by Harriet Hofner, Anna Vaughn Hyatt, Janet Scudder, Beatie Potter, Bonnah, Zinnie Ream Hoxie, Edmonia Lewis, Evelyn Beatrice Longman, Helen Phillips of Fresno, Calif., and Malvina Hoffmann, most famous of women sculptors and author of "Heads and Tales".

Chinaware formed the topic of a discussion by Miss Jane Suedicor which members report as interesting and comprehensive. Having studied at the Chicago Art Institute and made further researches on the subject, Miss Suedicor is considered a well-informed speaker on the subject.

Included in Miss Suedicor's discussion were the history of china, which originated in the country of China, the composition, manufacture and decoration, biographies of famous craftsmen and a description and comparison of chinaware of various countries.

Members and friends of the club contributed to a collection of old and outstanding china as an exhibit to add to the discussion. The exhibit included purple willow ware, Dresden and a very rare rice-china, brought by Miss Suedicor; willow ware, Majolica and others, by Miss Fanny Whitman; rare Chelsea, Parian, Rose willow ware and others by Mrs. William P. Holt; Dresden, Mrs. Burdette Dodge.

Other wares exhibited included old lustre ware pitchers, loaned by Miss Whitman, Mrs. J. H. Cochran and Mrs. B. B. Lowry; articles of old Bavarian, Beieck, Dalton and other English wares, by various members. Of much interest was the beautiful exhibit of Spode loaned by Mrs. John F. Lawrence.
