

ROOSEVELT TAKES CHARGE OF RELIEF IN FLOOD REGION

Ontario province, was reported dropping steadily, relieving pressure on London and other points in the province.

Optimistic reports were received from Johnstown, Pa., Richmond, Va., Wheeling, W. Va., and other cities in the inundated area.

New York was added to the list of afflicted states with the flooding of the Chadokoin river. Water was seeping through into cellars of Jamestown and causing many families to evacuate their homes.

Flood Crest Coming

Rivers in eastern North Carolina were expected to reach moderate flood stage late today or tomorrow. Predictions were that the Cape Fear, Neuse, Tar and Roanoke rivers would leave their banks.

Heavy wind and rain storms off the Atlantic seaboard were reported at Wilmington, Del., and a Nova Scotia fishing boat went down in a storm off the Virginia capes after its crew had been rescued by another fishing vessel.

GAS CONSUMPTION GROWS ON COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, April 27.—(AP)—Pacific coast gas companies sold 40,135,760,000 cubic feet of gas during the first two months of this year, gaining 14.5 percent over the 1936 volume.

Revenue from sales increased about 12.7 percent to \$20,857,097 from \$17,878,635.

Domestic sales, including house heating, absorbed more than half the total volume, and accounted for more than \$16,000,000 of the revenue. This division increased 43.2 percent in volume of sales and 25.1 percent in revenues.

The revenue gain was smaller than the volume gain because of lower rates to householders.

Oregon household sales exclusive of house-heating were 230,566 MCF, while house-heating sales were 393,840 MCF. The latter gained 29.5 percent and the former 3.4 percent. Revenues from general domestic use gained 2.1 percent, totalling \$274,224, and house-heating revenues increased 23.4 percent to \$149,633.

MORMON CHURCH TO CARE FOR OWN

SALEM, April 27.—(AP)—Interested keenly in the work relief program of the Church of Latter Day Saints at Salt Lake City Governor Henry H. Blood of Utah said today its success would aid materially the already sound financial status of that state.

Governor Blood, here on a visit with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. David J. Ellison, said that 48 hours before he left Salt Lake City the heads of the Mormon church announced a program which would eliminate all members of the faith from accepting relief from any government agency.

"The program is a progressive step and its working will be watched with interest," the slender white-haired executive declared. "It will be a mammoth task but the goal will be to make them all independent of any agency outside the church. It will prove a great aid to our state relief program and does set a very fine example."

HIGH COURT RULES IN TIMBER CLAIM

SALEM, April 27.—(AP)—The supreme court upheld today the contention of the new Grand Ronde Lumber company in Polk county that it was not obligated to pay the full contract price of \$165,819 when timber on the land involved proved insufficient to produce the amount.

Suit to collect the amount was brought by W. B. Yates and others in the circuit court of Benton county before Judge James T. Brand. The lower court's decree rejecting the creditor's bill was affirmed in the lone opinion written by Justice John L. Brand.

In oral opinions the court denied the petition for releasing in the personal injury suit of Broad versus Kelly's Olympian Co. and admitted Walton Porter Bondles of Portland to practice law on certificate from Texas.

WOODRING NOMINATED AS SECRETARY OF WAR

WASHINGTON, April 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt nominated Harry H. Woodring of Kansas today to be secretary of war.

The former Kansas governor has been holding down the war post since the death last fall of George H. Dern of Utah.

The president also sent to the senate the name of Harold P. Burke of Rochester, N. Y., to be United States district judge for the western district of New York.

He nominated John J. Keegan of Indiana for the United States employees' compensation commission for a six-year term from March 15, 1937.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 27.—(AP)—Charles Ward, 63, inmate of a home for the aged, was killed last night when a street car ran over him on the Vancouver trestle. Motorman Daniel C. Sullivan said he did not see Ward prostrate on the tracks until it was too late to stop.

John L. Lewis' C. I. O. and William Green's American Federation of Labor launched aggressive campaigns among workers in the southern textile industries. A. Steve Nance, C. I. O. leader, announced at Atlanta that his drive was nearing full swing in a number of southern cities, while George Googe, A. F. L. representative, said he had been authorized by President Green to enlarge his staff for the campaign.

At Pittsburgh, Federal Judge Nelson McVicar denied the petition of the A. F. L. for an injunction restraining the New Kensington, Pa. local of the Aluminum Workers of America from turning over its \$27,000 treasury to the C. I. O.

It also approved submitting a preliminary application for a humanities building for the University of Oregon with the understanding that no cost to the board would be involved in preparation of the request.

A WPA remodeling project for the old library at the university was approved. Under it quarters would be provided for the law school. The new library was formally accepted and the contractors complimented for a "complete, attractive, efficient building."
