

CHURCH IS SAVED BY WAKEFUL GIRL

EUGENE, April 27.—(AP)—Only the wakefulness of little Betty Torrence of Harrisburg saved the Methodist church from going up in flames there early this morning. It is believed incendiaries attempted to fire the structure.

Betty, who had got out of bed to get a drink of water about 3 a. m., noticed the glare of fire near the basement door of the church, situated across the street from the Torrence home.

She awakened her older brother and told him of the fire. The boy turned in the alarm and the Harrisburg fire department answered the call and extinguished the blaze.

An inspection revealed that oil-soaked papers had been placed against the basement door.

Rogue river valley pears dominated the week's shipment of 18 cars. Unsold holdings consist chiefly of Winter Nells but there are a few remaining cars of D'Anjou.
