

# Stocks Stage Recovery Parade After Recent Drastic Downturns

## SHARP COMEBACK IS REGISTERED IN LIMITED TRADING

### Steels and Rails Lead Up-swing — Profit Taking in Final Trading Reduces Showing in Some Issues

NEW YORK, April 30.—(AP)—Stocks stepped into the recovery parade today and retrieved fractions to 6 or more points of their recent setbacks.

The come-back was accomplished on exceptionally small volume considering the breadth of the advance. Financial commentators thought many traders were still "frozen" in and unable to participate because of impaired margin accounts. Others, it was believed, were a bit skeptical of the reversal of the trend and declined to trade until the situation cleared about was more definitely established. Brokerage quarters said the upturn was partly of a technical nature, inspired by considerable short covering, reinvestment demand, drying up of foreign selling and improvement in lately weak Paris and London markets.

Steels and rails led the revival, closely trailed by farm implements, rubbers, electrical equipments and specialties. There was some cashing in of profits on the final lap and top prices were lower in many instances before the close.

Transfers were around 1,400,000 shares.

## RETAIL SALES UP IN WEEK'S REVIEW

NEW YORK, April 30.—(AP)—Nearly all branches of trade and business have improved during the week, Dun & Bradstreet said today in the weekly review.

"Consumers were in a spending mood, and on some of the best days retail sales were almost on a par with the pre-Easter bulge," the report states.

"Buying in wholesale markets started to widen, with repeat orders of better proportions, while summer merchandise was sought actively."

The agency estimated retail sales for the country as a whole at 8 to 20 percent over the 1936 figure, and 2 to 5 per cent above the preceding week.
