

Estes Pits Speed and Cleverness Against Britt's Brawn Tonight

DROP KICKER AND ARM BREAKER IN MAIN MAT EVENT

Pete Belcastro Tangles With Cowboy McEwan in Semi-Final — Pettigrove and O'Brien Will Stage Opener

The question that has been going the rounds of local wrestling circles regarding the main event brawl tonight in the Medford Armory between Toots Estes, the movie-hero appearing Adonia, and big, tough Alvin Britt is simply this: Can the popular Toots stay clear of Alvin's devastating arm-breaker hold long enough to hammer home a few drops?

Upon the ability of Estes to do that little thing seems to depend his chances of whipping the ex-heavyweight champ of the world, according to the experts. It is said that Britt is far too powerful a grappler for Estes; that if he ever clamps on the painful hold, barred in most states except Oregon, there will be nothing left but the mere formality of placing the shoulders of Estes gently to the carpet.

As for Estes, it is admitted freely that he is one in a million when it comes to pure, unadorned speed and sensational wrestling ability. No grappler has been seen here that can approach the panther-like alibity of Toots.

Tools infer that he will throw considerably more than several drops in the general direction of Britt's placid face tonight.

In the middle event, Pete Belcastro, who fell victim to Britt's pet maneuver last week, will tangle with Cowboy Bill McEwan, undefeated to date in the Medford ring. Like Estes, Belcastro is a master of the dropkick, one of the most colorful maneuvers, and he will probably use it freely in an attempt to stop McEwan's string of wins and himself, get back into the main event calibre, from which he fell with a resounding thud after Britt got through with him.

In the opening event, Duke Pettigrove, the New Orleans meanie, will meet Pat ("Poppey") O'Brien, himself no angel. The status of this bout is a matter of conjecture in the sense that nobody knows just what sort of methods O'Brien will use against the Pettigrove roughneck.

O'Brien has been known to be both dry and clean. As for Duke, there is no secret regarding his ideas of a grappling match. He knows only one method, and that is to foul and torture to the nth degree.

HOPPE AND SCHAEFER TO DISPLAY GUE ART HERE TUESDAY NIGHT

Willie Hoppe and Jake Schaefer, recognized as the two greatest billiard players in the world, will be in Medford tomorrow evening. They will stage a special challenge match at Brown's beginning at 8:30, giving an exhibition of the new 38-2 ballgame.

Hoppe is considered the greatest all-around player of all time. He is the world's 18.1 and cushion carom champion, and 18-2 ballgame and three-cushion title holder. Hoppe's finest single performance is listed in the All Sports Record book as taking place at Pasadena, Calif., against Schaefer several years ago. At that time, he ran 250 points at 18.2 ballgame in the space of one foot square on intersecting 18-inch lines at the head of the table.

Schaefer is called the greatest of all ballgame stars, holding all ballgame titles. He is the undefeated world's 18.1 and 18.2 champion.

ANGILLEY'S FLEET COPS MAIN MONEY IN 20-30 REGATTA

Fluhrer Wins Second Heat in F Hydroplane Event—2500 See Well Handled Events in Fine Weather

Before an estimated crowd of 2500 spectators, the Medford 20-30 club staged its second annual outdoor motorboat regatta yesterday at Emigrant lake, with 22 of the most famous drivers on the Pacific coast sending their boats of all classes skimming over almost perfect water.

There were thrills galore for the huge crowd that packed the north bank of the man-made lake. Although there were no spills, the sight of the trim craft hammering down the straightaways and into sharp turns at better than 40 miles an hour was excitement enough, and several exceptionally close finishes brought life to hundreds of automobile horns.

The outfit of Ward Angilley of Marysville, Calif., national outdoor champion, took home the lion's share of the \$470 prize money. Angilley, in his C-7 Lloyddip and Sweetheart the 8th, won four first places and three seconds, and Harold Ashley, a member of Angilley's outfit, roared home in front of the field in five events. Ashley drove his own boat in several events, and operated Angilley's speeders in a couple of others.

Fluhrer Wins Heat

Heine Fluhrer, Medford ace, decided to attempt at the last minute and booted his "Bad News" to the finish line to win the second heat of the F Hydroplane event. His time for the five-mile course was 6:42, and he was forced to defeat Angilley to win. The Marysville ace finished second in 6:47.

In the first heat of the same event, Angilley beat the local flyer in 6:47; Fluhrer's time being 6:52. Those were the only two events Fluhrer entered, and he got a nice welcome from the auto horns as he pulled into the pit after winning.

Wes Loback of Seattle won a pair of first places and Jim Harland of Seattle and Tommy Carstens of Tacoma each took a first place.

Stage Close Finish

The most sensational race of the afternoon was the second heat of the F Racing Runabout, won by Jim Harland in 6:48. He and Tommy Carstens ran neck and neck the entire distance, with the former nosing out a victory by only a few feet.

With the exception of Fluhrer, local drivers failed to win a first place. Jim Dally, who was figured to cop his share of events, blew his motor in the first event he entered, and Howdy Murray's motor failed to function before he could enter. Moose Muthhead entered boats in several events with Bob Watkins as his driver, and took some second and third places.

Aubrey Sander, general chairman of the 20-30 club regatta committee, performed on a surfboard behind a motor launch, and his was the only spill of the entire program. He tumbled off at the end of the race.

Races Well Handled

All events were run off in rapid succession, with little time wasted between. Each race was over a five-mile course, the fastest time of the day being turned in by Heine Fluhrer in the second heat of the F Hydroplane event, which he won in 6:42, an average of 44.77 m. p. h.

CAVEMEN BLANK MEDFORD 9 TO 0 IN INITIAL TILT

Grants Pass Puts Game On Ice in Third Frame When Four Hits and Defensive Break Lets in 7 Markers

Behind the six-hit pitching of Phil Griggs, young right-hander, the Grants Pass Merchants opened the Southern Oregon league baseball season at Grants Pass yesterday with a 9-0 victory over Medford. One of the smallest opening day crowds in years attended.

The Merchants sealed the ball game in the third inning when a momentary defensive crack in the Medford team and four hits enabled them to score seven times. They added two more tallies in the fifth for "good measure."

Ray Tungate and Larry Pepper hurled for the locals, Manager Mike Balkovick yanking Tungate in the third inning after the damage had been done. Pepper pitched the remainder of the game and set the Merchants down with three hits and a pair of runs.

One Get to Third

Medford got only one man to third base. In the fifth inning, Dick Sakraida walked, and after Sam Van Dyke fanned, Manager Balkovick singled into right field. The threat ended there as Pepper and Dick Lewis singled out. The other five Medford safeties were scattered over as many innings. Stone singled in the second with one away, and died right there. Rickert singled in the fourth with none out, but his teammates couldn't advance him. In the sixth, Swanson singled to center and was left stranded and in the eighth Donovan got a blow to left, but died on the initial cushion.

An infield hit by McCarthy, a wild throw to second by Dick Lewis on Halsaa's grounder, a not a hot infield catcher by Macdonald and Chuck Ostrum's double to left provided the explosion in Grants Pass' big third inning. Van Dyke dropped a line drive off the bat of Ray Hartman walked, and Blacksmith singled to left to chase Tungate from the mound.

Pepper scooped Griggs' drive off the ground and fired to Rickert at second, who in turn heaved to Swanson at first for a sweet double play to end the nightmarish inning. The damage had been done, however, and the Merchants' other two runs in the fifth were needless. They were produced when Ostrum took one on the shoulder, went to third on Ray's single to center, and scored in front of Ray when Hartman singled to right.

Medford's infield, rated one of the finest in the circuit, lived up to that honor by turning in three lumps when Ostrum took one on the shoulder, started one, and Lewis and Rickert each began a double killing.
