

# LOCAL TRAVELERS GAIN FIRST-HAND STRIKE EVIDENCE

permission from union authorities to do so.

The lobby was thronged with policemen and Pinkerton men, Mrs. Rosenberg said. Managers continued to attempt to serve patrons but with little success. Efforts by them to run the switchboard and to take care of desk details resulted in considerable confusion, guests having to wait for some time as a hotel executive searched for keys or attempted to put through a telephone call.

Patrons carried their own bags although hotel managers would always assist whenever possible. Taxi-cab drivers refused to park near the hotel, sympathizing with the strikers enough to stay well outside picket lines. By Sunday, however, they were taking up their stands in the same block as the hotel although some distance from entrances.

New visitors were not being registered in most of the affected hotels, Mrs. Rosenberg stated, as it was impossible to take care of the guests already there. Beds went unmade, dirty linen piled up and the resulting confusion presented a major problem to the hotels.

According to Mrs. Rosenberg, an entirely different attitude could be seen following the walk-out, a depression seeming to have settled over the entire hotel.

First-night pickets, Mrs. Rosenberg said, seemed to be largely Filipinos while women predominated in the picket ranks Sunday.

Mrs. Rosenberg believes that the hotel men were taken entirely by surprise at the strike and she states they were evidently extremely worried over the situation. On Sunday they seemed to believe the strike may continue for another week, she said.

While she found it an interesting experience, Mrs. Rosenberg stated she doesn't think it would be so much of a lark for a longer period. She said she was not greatly inconvenienced and is glad she had the opportunity of observing a strike situation. She and her daughter returned home this morning.
