

FORMER EUREKAN STUMPS ENGLAND CLAIMING THRONE

'King Anthony the First' Claims History Books Are Wrong — Warns Edward Left George to Ride to Fall

LONDON, Eng., May 4.—(AP) King George the Sixth is a busy man these days.

So is "King Anthony the First," who asserts George hasn't any business preparing for a coronation a day from Wednesday (May 12), which rightfully should be his own.

Anthony Hall is 39, getting baldish on the top of his head, tall, and serious. He used to live at Eureka and Healdsburg, Calif. before he returned to England to stomp about the country.

He asserts he's ninth in direct male descent from Anne Boleyn and Henry VIII, and that the English throne hasn't been the same since Queen Elizabeth died in 1603.

Hiding to Fall

"Edward didn't get off the throne just because of 'Wally,'" he said. "He knew what was in the wind. And he left his brother, George to ride to a fall."

"King Anthony" thinks he'll be up there on the throne by 1940. Meanwhile, he's spurring his campaign, speaking nightly to hundreds, he said in an interview today.

"You know," he said, "popular feeling is a fickle thing. Just look at Edward's case. If the people were really so strong in Edward's favor, the Thames would have been running blood last December."

"And you'd be surprised at what my followers tell me when I ask them what amount of a pension Edward should have. The highest suggestion was 500 pounds a year (about \$2500)."

Would Buy Island

"There's a story going around that Edward got some money out of his Cornwall property when he left, and that he proposed to buy the Isle of Wight off the coast of England."

"I always tell my meetings that Edward could then make 'Wally' Simpson 'Queen of Cows.'"

"My audiences always get a laugh out of that one."

Hall, a former police inspector in the Shropshire constabulary, said he realized a lot of people didn't take his speeches seriously.

"But I don't mind. And I don't try to give them a lot of history."

"I just try to be funny."

When he gets back on the throne, "King Anthony" will wipe all war debts off the books, including what England owes the United States, he said.

"George the Third was all a mistake. He was just plain George Guelf and had no right to the British throne. Therefore, I nullify his actions in losing the American colonies."

Hall said the crown of England was won by his ancestor, Henry Tudor, Earl of Richmond, at the battle of Bosworth in 1485.

Henry Tudor was crowned King Henry VII on the battlefield, and his son, Henry VIII, married Anne Boleyn.

Ninth in Line

"I'm ninth in direct descent from their son, John."

The history books don't have that birth in them, but that doesn't deter Hall. A lot of things have escaped the history books of England, he will tell you.

Then the real King James VI of Scotland died and a changeling named James Erskine was put in his cradle. That substituted baby became James I of England after Queen Elizabeth's death.

Later the bones of the dead real king were found, but it was hushed up, he said.

The claimant to the British throne spends his mornings reading the papers and studying his reports, he said. He wasn't very active in 1932, '33 and '34, he said, because he took time out to take courses in economics and banking.

"Preparing myself to take over when I get on the throne," is the way he put it.

10 SCHOOLS PLAN JOINT PLAY DAY AT EAGLE POINT

Thursday Event Will Provide Group Games, Track Meet, Picnic Lunch, and Crowning of May Queen

EAGLE POINT, May 4.—(Sp.)—Preparations are being made for an inter-school play day by Eagle Point schools, nine other schools having been invited to participate. Schools joining Eagle Point for the event Thursday will be Antelope, Lake Creek, Brownboro, Lost Creek, Trail, Reese Creek, Derby, Little Butte Creek, Shady Cove.

Students are to be handled in three groups for morning events, the first consisting of those eight years old and under; the next nine to 11 years, inclusive; and last, 12 and over. Group games will be provided for the two lower groups while those of the middle classification who choose and those of the upper group will com-

pete in a track meet between teams of color groups.

Children will be divided into color groups so that there will not be too many in each group. Teachers from visiting schools will be asked to supervise some of these groups. Where contest games are held, these will be between color teams.

For track purposes, pupils will be classified into classes A and B, class A consisting of those 12 and over, and class B those under 12. Track events will include 50-yard dash, 75-yard dash, 100-yard dash and 220-yard relay. Field events are to be: Running high jump, standing broad jump, 8-pound shotput and pole vault. Scoring will be as follows: First place, 3 points and blue ribbon; second place, 2 points and blue ribbon; third place, 1 point and white ribbon.

Children are to bring picnic lunches, with tables and benches to be supplied. Candy and ice cream will be available from concessions, installed for the purpose of defraying expenses of the occasion. Parents of children are invited.

Afternoon program is to include a May Day pageant, beginning at 1 o'clock. Those appearing will include: Marian Chamberlain, Paul Andre, Irene Charley, Margaret Simmons, Arlene Hickson, Dixie Allen, Dickie Carter, Leonard Adamson. Marian Chamberlain has been designated May Queen and will be crowned with appropriate ceremony. The high school orchestra and other students will take part in the pageant program.

A tennis tournament is planned to follow the pageant at 2 o'clock. Jacksonville and Eagle Point will meet in a conference baseball game at 3 p. m. During the morning, an intermission from games will be taken for an assembly of songs and stories. This will not apply to those engaged in the track meet.

Time between the May pageant and the baseball game may be used for games of kittenball.

Coast Business Slightly Better

SAN FRANCISCO, May 4.—(AP)—The Strassburger index of Pacific coast business gained slightly in the week of April 24, reaching 92.7 percent of the average business volume of 1936. The rise was from 92.4, the index for the preceding week.

The index has been on a rather irregular decline from the January top a couple of points over 100. A year ago the index stood at 89.9.

Production of power, lumber and crude oil boosted indexes for these lines while bank debits, car loadings and oil refining were a little lower for the week.

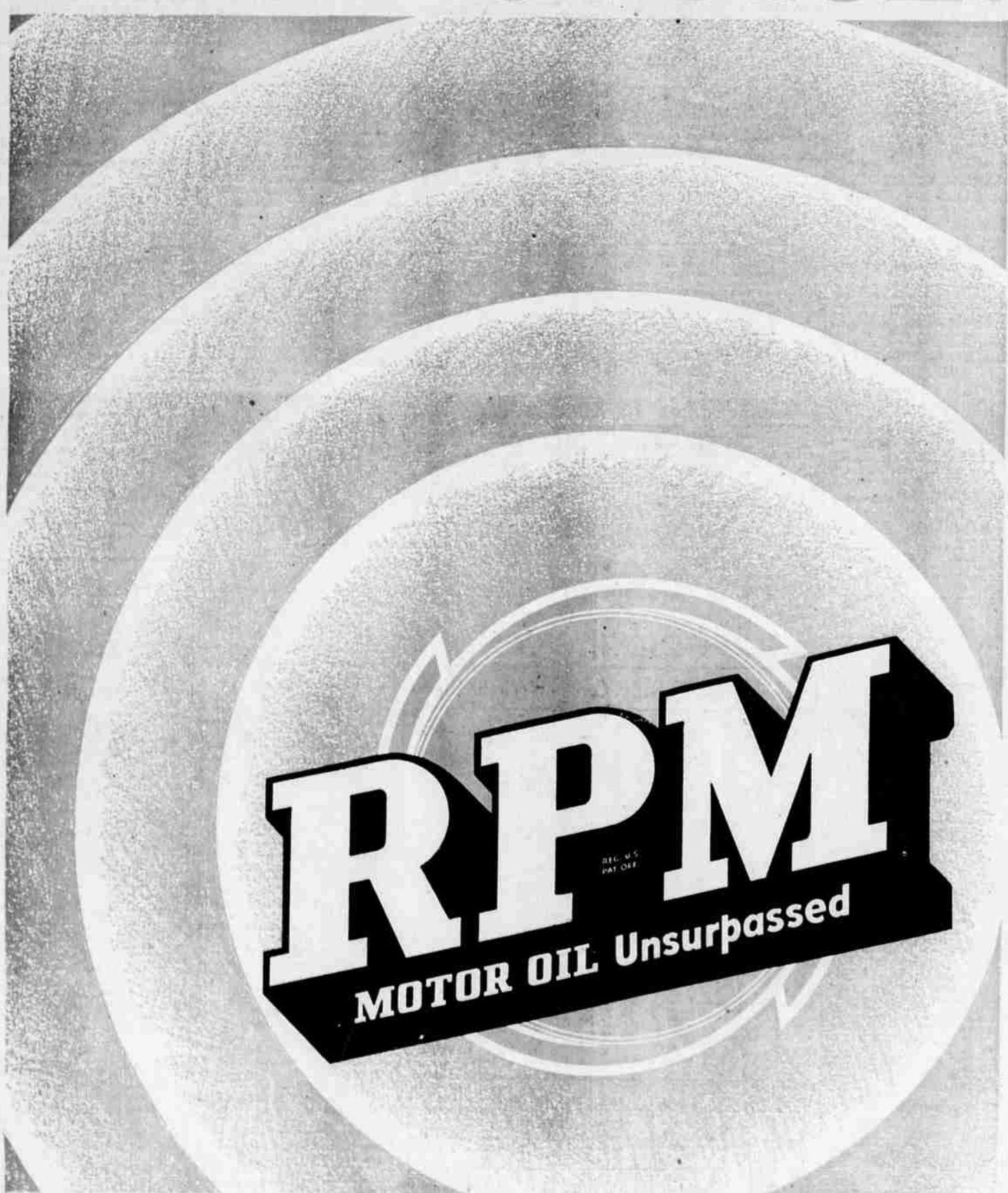
