WINTER CLOSURE OF CRATER PARK IS ECONOMY HINT

Year's winter attendance represented a gain of 56.2 percent over that of the previous year, he stated.

Last month cars were registered from 26 different states and British Columbia, Mr. Canfield said. Since December 1, he added, 36 states and Canada and England have been represented by the car registrations.

"This shows that the park will be used in winter if it is kept open, for we have made no attempt to publicize the fact that the park was open excepting locally," the superintendent continued. "Out-of-state travelers did not know they could get to the park in winter until they had arrived here. If we had enough funds to keep it open next winter, we had planned to publicize the fact throughout the country."

When the park is not kept open in the winter, the normal tourist season closes about November 1, and does not open again until mid-June. Winter closure thus shortens the travel season in both the spring and the fall. Mr. Canfield pointed out. It takes a tremendous effort to open the park in the spring when the snow is allowed to pile up all winter, he said.

It had also been planned, he stated, to have cafeteria services available next winter. He added that he had been informed the state highway department would have enough equipment next year to keep the approach highways open continuously throughout the winter.
