Permits for burnings on forest areas will be required beginning May 15.

Accepts Position—Mrs. Guy Wilcox, formerly employed at the United States National bank in Grants Pass, has accepted a position here. She is visiting at present in Ames, Iowa, before returning to take up her residence here.

Hanlin Goes East—Paul Hanlin, who left here last Friday night for Portland where he was assigned to the staff of United States Marshal J. T. Sumnerville, departed Saturday night with a group of prisoners for Marlin, Mich. He accompanied Chief Deputy Marshal Frank Williams. Mr. Hanlin is being trained to fill the post of deputy marshal to which he was recently appointed. He is to take charge of the Medford office.

Ready for Convention—Plans were completed in Salem Monday for the annual convention of the Oregon Fire Chiefs association to be held here June 24, 25 and 26. It was stated today by Chief Roy Elliott. The convention program is now being printed and will be ready for distribution in a few days, Chief Elliott said. The program contains many features that will be of interest to the public, he added. Mr. Elliott attended the meeting of the convention committee which made the final arrangements. He returned to Medford yesterday afternoon.

Brings Prisoner—Leo McLain, United States deputy marshal, returned to his office here last night after transferring 11 federal prisoners to Portland. On his way back he went to Marshfield where he took into custody Bert L. Gibson, 47, of North Bend, who is charged with violating the postal laws by sending

a defamatory postcard through the mails. Gibson was bound over to the federal grand jury by a justice of the peace in Marshfield and will later be transferred to Portland by Mr. McLain. He is now in the Jackson county jail.

ENROLLEES WILL GET CIVILIAN POSTS HERE UNDER NEW CCC PLAN

A number of CCC men will receive civilian jobs at district headquarters here on August 1 when all headquarters positions now held by enrollees will be placed under civilian ratings. It was stated today by Maj. George R. Owens, district commander. There are unofficial reports also that headquarters staff will be centralized at the fairgrounds in the fall. The staff is now divided between the fairgrounds and the old Medford city hall. The centralization, if authorized, would be for the purpose of achieving a more unified and therefore more efficient administrative staff. At present 21 civilian positions are

held at district headquarters. With the change in policy, between 60 and 80 civilian ratings will be added. Major Owens said. The change, the major explained, will enable the headquarters staff to settle down on a permanent basis, undisturbed by a constant turnover in personnel through normal discharge of enrollees and the loss of men who find private employment. It is probable that headquarters detachment will be discontinued as an organization after July 31. Major Owens said.
