Plans Unsettled  
Soon after the wedding the couple are expected to leave the chateau. Redecoration of their prospective honeymoon retreat in southern Austria, Wasserloeben castle, will be completed about June 1. Edward and the Austrian castle for \$400 a month.

Perhaps a week will elapse between the coronation and Edward's marriage, in line with the duke's plan to detract as little attention as possible from the London celebration. Plans for the honeymoon, it was said authoritatively, were still uncertain. One project understood to be under consideration would take the duke and duchess on a good will tour of African and other British colonies.

# DISMISSAL SOUGHT IN DR. KUNZ SUIT

Motion for dismissal of the suit of Dr. C. E. Kunz against J. E. Trevor and Walter H. Leverette, operators of the Medford Center building, has been filed on the grounds the complaint contains "two causes of action, not separately pleaded."

Dr. Kunz in a personal injury damage suit seeks \$45,000 general and \$2,065 special damages, as the result of the fall of an electric light shade on June 22 last. The plaintiff alleges the shade struck him on the shoulder and head, causing injury and impairment of hearing capacity. Dr. Kunz was working at a dental chair when the shade fell.

Attorney A. E. Jones represents the defendant and his brother, Attorney Charles W. Reame, represents the plaintiff in the action.

Cannon is now serving ten days in the county jail, on a charge of driving an auto without an operator's license. The sentence was imposed last Saturday.

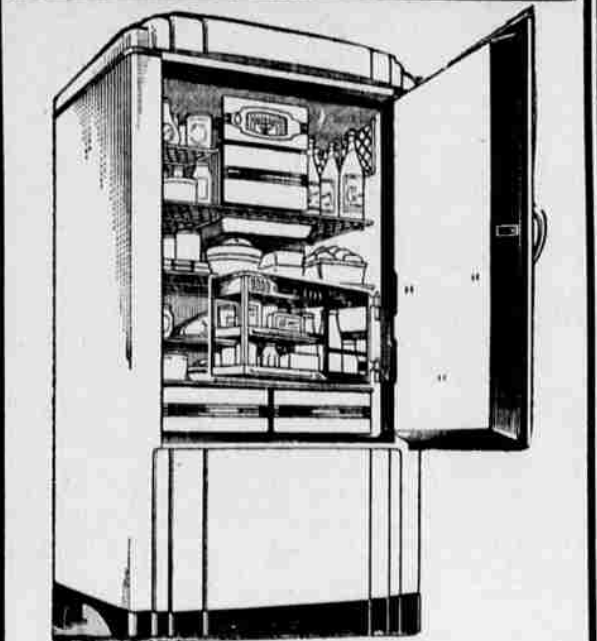
