PHOENIX VICTOR COUNTY B SCHOOL TRACK CONTESTS

Central Point School Second, J'ville Third In Normal School Meet—Hundred Boys Compete.

Phoenix high school's powerful track and field team won the sixth annual Jackson county class B high school meet sponsored by the Southern Oregon Normal school yesterday at Ashland by piling up 80 1/2 points. Central Point finished second with 63 1/2 points and Jacksonville was third with 41 points. Other scores were: Gold Hill 17, Eagle Point 10, Prospect 10 and Tualen 6.

Nearly 100 athletes competed in the huge event which was divided into two classifications—A and B—according to age, height and weight. Central Point scored 43 1/2 points in the class A division to top all others, but Phoenix scored heavily in the B classification to win the meet.

All individual winners were presented ribbons by Meet Director Jean Eberhart, and Phoenix and Central Point were awarded cups by Coach Linn Mills of Talent high school, secretary of the county athletic association. Phoenix gained its cup for winning the meet and Central Point was presented the cup whose winner was figured on the number of points scored according to the average daily attendance in school.

Grimes, Central Point, and Olson, Phoenix, each took three first places. Grimes won the 50 and 100-yard dashes and the 220-yard run in class A, and Olson took the pole vault, broad jump and 120-yard low hurdles in the same class.

Larry Kaiser was announcer and Aris Ager, clerk of the course. Field judges were Darrell Leavens, Leonard Patterson, Jim McBride and Bob Napier.

ERICKSON NAMED STARTING HURLER FOR COAST GAME

Ray Erickson, young right-hander with the booming fast ball and razor-edged curve, will probably start on the mound for Manager Mike Balkovick's Medford Craters today in Crescent City in the opening Southern Oregon league game for the coast city. A last minute change may see Larry Pepper on the rubber, Manager Balkovick announced, although he said his mind was pretty well made up regarding Erickson as the pitching choice.

Other Southern Oregon league games today will see Grants Pass traveling to Glendale and Ashland making the hop to Roseburg.

The remainder of the Crater club will see Balkovick behind the plate, Hoffman on first base, Wally Rickert at second, Dick Lewis on short and Donovan on third. In the out-field, Riggs Swanson will patrol left, Dick Sakraite will take care of center, and either Malcolm Stine or Ray Lewis will be in left.

In addition to Erickson and Pepper, Ray Turgate will make the trip to Crescent City, and will be ready for mound action in case he is needed.

COUGARS DEFEAT OREGON HANDILY

PULLMAN, Wash., May 8.—(AP)—Sweeping all the places in five events, Washington State's speedsters routed a crushing 90 to 41 track and field victory over the University of Oregon here today.

Without the services of Lee Orr, Olympic games sprinter who was out with a leg strain, the Cougars raced to victory in all the short track events. They finished in one-two-three order in the dashes, 440 and both hurdle races.

Blond Lorin (Bill) Benke, captain and all-around star, led his teammates to victory with a new northern division Coast conference record in the 440. His time of 47.1 seconds bettered the 48-second mark established by Talbot Hartley, of Washington, in 1931.

The Cougars captured 10 of the 15 first places, dropping only the mile and half mile on the track and the discus, shot put and pole vault in the field.

MEDFORD CHOSEN BY NAZARENE CH. FOR 38 CONCLAVE

Medford was chosen for next year's north Pacific district assembly of the Church of the Nazarene, it was stated in a telegram received yesterday afternoon by the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce from the Rev. Fred M. Weatherford, local pastor who was attending the annual convocation in Seattle, Wash. Between 300 and 400 usually attend the yearly conference.

Telegrams inviting the assembly to Medford were sent last Monday evening to the Rev. Mr. Weatherford by Mayor George W. Porter and Olen Arnsperger, chamber president. The telegram received here yesterday said: "North Pacific district accepts Medford invitation for 1938."

This was the second regional conference procured for Medford in the past week. The Disabled American Veterans accepted an invitation to hold its 1938 northwest district convention here. The district embraces Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

REPORT NUDISTS ORGANIZING HERE

GRANTS PASS, May 8.—(AP)—Nudists of southern Oregon and northern California are organizing, according to unsigned notices being mailed from Ashland with return address to a free-lance writer there. "Siskiyon Sunbathers" is the name chosen, and its membership will be confined to married couples and their children, at least in the beginning, the sponsors are quoted.

"Among those who are reported to have expressed a desire to join such a society are young married couples in Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls, and Yreka," the prospectus states.

A call for an organization meeting will be held soon, probably in Ashland or Medford, with communications to be addressed to the temporary secretary at Ashland (box 42), who says a permanent nudist camp may not be established this year but members may enjoy a number of week-ends together at a temporary camp.

A high moral standard is required, the communication says, and "the use of liquor, tobacco, or profane language will be strictly prohibited."
