HOLLYWOOD, Calif., May 10.—(AP)—High salaried movie stars, victorious in their demands from the producers, went to work as usual this morning while conflicting statements came from leaders of the studio craft unions, which are still on strike.

"It is a dirty double-cross. The actors sold us out," said Charles Leasing, business manager of the Federated Motion Picture Crafts. He was commenting on the peace agreement between the producers and the Screen Actors' guild, announced last night.

FILM PRODUCERS AND ACTOR GUILD SIGN AGREEMENT

Threat of Production Paralysis Is Avoided by Action of Major Companies — Crafts Are Not Reconciled

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., May 10.—(AP) The ominous threat of a film actors' strike, with production paralyzed, theater programs curtailed and a \$1,750,000 weekly payroll in the movie capital stopped, gave way today to a working agreement between producers and the screen actors' guild.

The actors' guild, meeting in the tamarack Hollywood Legion fight stadium, heard the concessions with a mighty shout of approval from 4,000 throats, accepted its committee's proposal to continue negotiations, and invested its representatives with power to call a walkout against the differing studios unless they fall into line quickly.

PORTLAND, May 10.—(AP)—Thirteen thousand loggers and sawmill workers returned to their jobs in the Columbia river district today while an arbitration board of seven members sat down to settle the dispute between employers and employees of the lumber industry.

Three labor representatives and three delegates from the employers' ranks comprise the board. Father George Thompson of Portland is the seventh and neutral arbiter. A. F. Hartung, president of the union; Worth Lowery of Jewell and Charles Van Deren of Forest Grove represent the employers while L. H. Mills, general manager of the Tidewater Timber Co., O. R. Miller, manager of the Roaster Products Co., and F. L. Thompson, head of the Big Creek Logging Co., will present the operators' views.

13,000 LOGGERS BACK TO JOBS IN COLUMBIA AREA

Agree to Resume Work While Arbitration Board Settles Dispute—Thirteen Days Given for Agreement

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Martin Ren-enacts Memorable Flight In Modern Plane

AVALON, Calif., May 10.—(AP)—Glenn Martin, one of aviation's pioneers, flew a huge trans-Pacific Clipper ship today over the route of a memorable flight he made May 10, 1912, in a flimsy home-made airplane.

He took off from Newport harbor on the mainland bound for Santa Catalina Island, a 38-mile jaunt. The little resort town of Avalon declared the occasion "Glenn Martin day." Villagers prepared a tumultuous welcome for the return visit of the first man ever to set a plane down on the blue waters of the bay.

'BLIND' CROSSING THROUGH RAINS TAKES 20 HOURS

Women Admirers Give Merrill and Lambie Kisses On Arrival—Will Hurry Back With Coronation Photos

CROYDON AIRDROME, Eng., May 10.—(AP)—The American coronation fliers, Dick Merrill and Jack Lambie, landed at Croydon at 6:38 p. m. (12:48 p. m. E.S.T.) to complete the eastward leg of an ambitious trans-oceanic flight that may put them back in New York by Thursday.

Neither showed the slightest sign of fatigue. Merrill popped out of the plane first and was rushed by a woman admirer who planted three resounding kisses. He took some minutes to remove the lipstick and remarked it was a "pretty tough trip."

DEATH OVERTAKES WOMAN AUTOIST

SALEM, May 10.—(AP)—While driving to Boise, Idaho, to attend her father's funeral Mrs. Cenna Bjornsen of Blue Point, near Eureka, Calif., died suddenly on the Pacific highway near Jefferson at noon Sunday.

Mrs. Bjornsen, who was about 50, was traveling alone. With only a rest of three hours at Canyonville she had driven steadily since leaving Eureka, she said before her death. Exhausted when she reached the Goin farm and service station four miles north of Jefferson she stopped her car at the roadside. After resting in the car for a time she reached the porch of the Goin home with difficulty and rapped on the house.

177 TO GRADUATE AT HIGH SCHOOL

The largest class of seniors ever to graduate from the Medford senior high school is expected to receive diplomas at commencement exercises scheduled for Friday, May 28, at 8 p. m. in the senior high school auditorium.

One hundred and seventy-seven students expect to graduate. The nearest to this number was the class of 1932 which numbered 172. Diplomas were issued to 153 last year. Dr. Bruce Baxter, president of Willamette university, will deliver the commencement address.

Father Of Sonja Dies Of Lung Ill

LOS ANGELES, May 10.—(AP)—Moon-faced, jovial Wilhelm Henie, whose greatest ambition was realized when his daughter, Sonja, won three Olympic skating championships, was mourned today.

The 65-year-old Norwegian died yesterday at a hospital here of a blood clot on the lung. He had been ill a week. At the bedside were his wife, his daughter and her actor friend, Tyrone Power. Burial may be in Norway.

Burglars Blamed For Frisco Blaze

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—(AP)—Police hunted today for burglars blamed by the fire department for a blaze yesterday which resulted in painful but not serious injuries to 23 firemen. The fire started in a coffee shop.

Captain Edward Buella of the fire department said he found ample evidence that the premises had been burglarized prior to the blaze, and that the burglars started the fire, either to destroy evidence, or through accident.

McAdoo Suggests Fifteen On Court

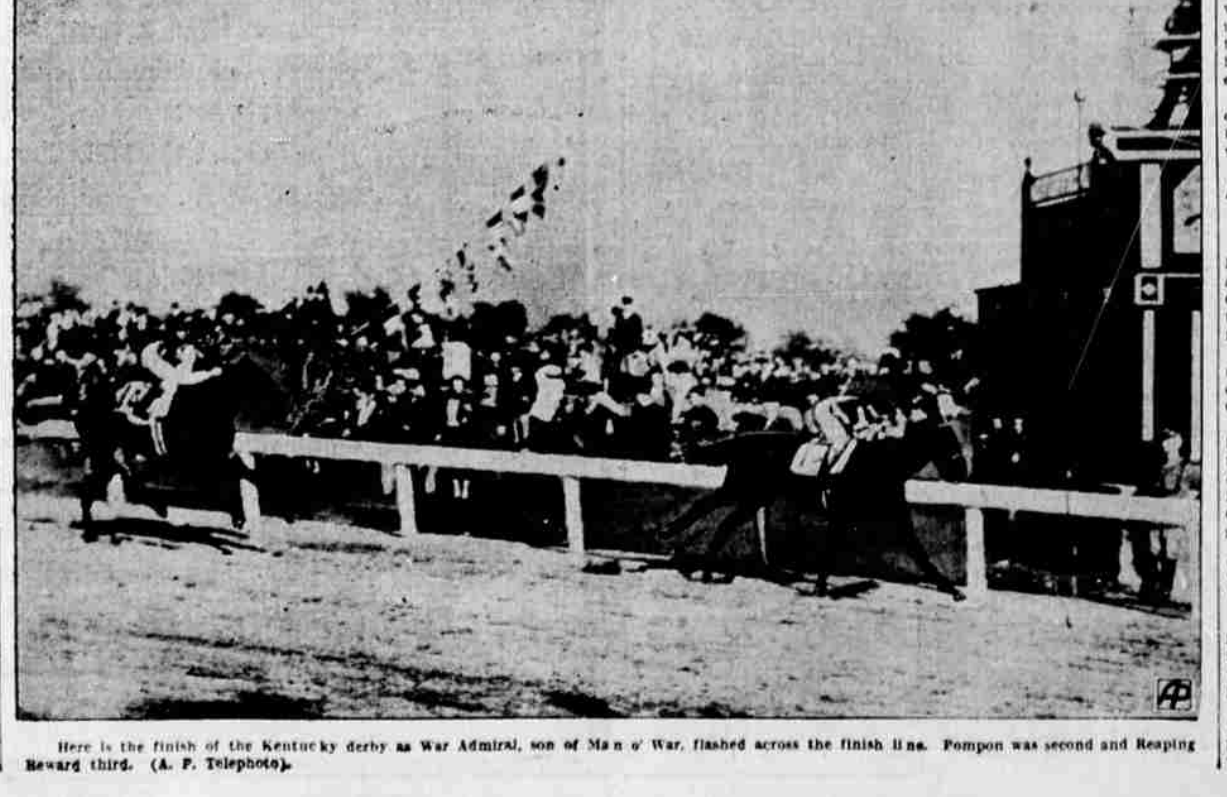

2 JAILED, 2 INJURED IN UNION BATTLING AT M. F. WAREHOUSE

PORTLAND, May 10.—(AP)—Violence at the Meier and Frank company warehouse, hub of a jurisdictional rift between the teamsters union and the International Longshoremen's association, sent two men to the police emergency hospital and two others to jail today.

Two alleged members of the longshore organization were booked on assault and battery charges after a scuffle with teamsters. Neither teamster was seriously injured.

The I. L. A. continued to picket the warehouse delivery depot and big department store downtown. Bert Shelton, business agent, said an announcement in the dispute will be made later today.

Philippine "flying squadrons" gave the controversy a racial touch Saturday when 200 jingling longshore pickets at the retail store. Police squads were kept busy chasing down other Filipinos reported molesting Meier and Frank trucks operated by teamsters. The islanders are members of cannery workers' unions affiliated with the I. L. A.

DEFENDERS OF BILBAO STIFFEN RESISTANCE TO REBEL ONSLAUGHT

MADRID, May 10.—(AP)—General Emilio Mola's insurgent army met stiffened resistance today as Basque and Austrian troops, aided by the women of Bilbao, dug new trenches to strengthen battered defenses of the Biscayan capital on Spain's northern coast.

Preparing for a fight to the finish in defense of Bilbao, government battalions blocked insurgent attackers north and east of the capital on the road to Begona and Galdacano, two principal gateways to the Basque seaport.

Soldiers and women rushed work on the city's defenses to the north, east and south, remembering the deficiency of fortifications at Malaga, southeastern seaport, which fell before an insurgent advance months ago.

Desperate fighting raged on Mount Sollube northeast of the city, where the Basques reported that Asturian brigade remained most of the ground lost in a retreat Saturday. (The insurgents, however, claimed possession of Mount Sollube's summit.)

The rocky heights of Orduña, south of Bilbao, formed a natural fortress against Gen. Mola's troops. Government forces retired east of Rigolta and Mugica to a position considered more easily defensible against a possible insurgent attempt to join forces for Guernica with those battling on Mount Sollube's slopes.

Putnam Hinted As Howard Successor

SALEM, May 10.—(AP)—Charles A. Howard, superintendent of public instruction, filed his resignation with Governor Martin today, effective September 1, thereby clearing the way for the appointment of his successor.

Howard's resignation followed his appointment as president of the Eastern Oregon Normal school at La Grande.

Reports here were to the effect Rex Putnam of Albany was favored for the post. He is a Democrat and has been at Albany the past five years as head of the school system there.

Governor Martin indicated he would make the appointment soon.

STABS SELF IN HEART WHILE ON PARKING DATE

SALEM, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—Harley Post, 28, employed at the Oregon blind school here, died of a self-inflicted wound in the heart Sunday which police said was self-inflicted.

Officers said Post plunged the knife into his heart while seated in his parked car with a young woman with whom he had been keeping company.

Steel Shipments Reach High Mark

NEW YORK, May 10.—(AP)—United States Steel corporation today reported April shipments of finished steel were 1,343,644 tons, highest April since 1929 when shipments were 1,499,300 tons.

The total was a decrease of 70,755 tons from the preceding month, but an increase of 363,737 tons over April, 1936.

For the first months of 1937 shipments rose to 5,041,885 tons, a gain of 39 per cent over the comparable period last year.
