TO ISSUE PERMITS FRIDAY FOR WORK IN FOREST AREAS

Applications for permits to carry on industrial activity in the forest areas will be received at the state forestry office, 1000 N. Midway road on Friday. State Inspector L. H. Morris will be at the office all day to take care of the applications and give other assistance to operators of the Medford and Ashland districts.

On Saturday, Mr. Morris will be at 901 East D street, Grants Pass, to issue permits for Josephine county.

The closed season in the forests begins May 15. On and after that date all operators in the western part of the state, whether engaged in logging, milling or other industrial activities, must have a permit before starting or continuing with their work.

The law regarding permits is protective in nature, intended primarily to keep the state forester informed of the location of various operations and how they may be reached in case of emergency.

On and after May 15 it will also be necessary to procure permits for any kind of burning in the forest areas. This applies to individuals, as well as companies. The permits may be obtained from any of the state wardens or inspectors or, in the case of national forest areas, from the nearest ranger.

While no official declaration has been made, the early preparations being made to avert forest fires indicate that the laws relating to the timber lands will be more rigidly enforced this year than ever before.

With an anticipated heavy fire of last fall still fresh in their minds, forest executives are expected to prosecute vigorously every violation of the laws this year.

For those willing to abide by the law, however, the state and national forest services are offering their cooperation in locating legitimate business and necessary burnings in the timber areas. Anyone seeking information or assistance is invited to call upon them at any time.

STEWARD FOR CHANGE IN ELECTION SYSTEM

WASHINGTON, May 11.—(AP)—Senator Steiwer (R.-Ore.) urged the senate today to approve a constitutional amendment to provide a national primary system for selecting candidates for president and vice-president.

Steiwer, keynote at the Cleveland Republican convention last year, said the existing political convention system was a "legislative no man's land" imperfectly reflecting popular will.

His amendment would provide for federal primaries in each state on the third day of May in presidential years both to register voters' preferences for presidential and vice-presidential candidates and to select party delegates.
