News Behind The News

 WASHINGTON, May 13.—Labor behemoth John Lewis hates anything green. His C. I. O. hates anything connected with A. F. of L. crafts. But when Mr. Lewis sent around specifications calling for bids on remodeling the University club palace here into a United Mine Workers' headquarters palace, the final stipulation he made was substantially this: In any work to be done, only Mr. Green's A. F. of L. craft union labor shall be employed.

The humor of Mr. Lewis providing jobs for the workers of Mr. Green is one thing. The hint that this battle of the behemoths has lately turned into something more of a family affair is another.
 For instance, there is the fact (few people know it) that Mr. Green has never been expelled from the Lewis United Mine Workers' union. Furthermore, the Lewis C. I. O. unions have not been expelled from the A. F. of L. They merely have suspended each other.
 That seems to sum up their real relationship behind their embattled headlines. They are in a state of suspension, possibly permanent suspension, but by no means as bitter suspension as they were some weeks ago.

This will probably be denied ardently. It may be said Mr. Lewis had no love for Mr. Green, but only self-preservation in mind when he wrote his palace specifications. All building trades unions are in the A. F. of L. and Mr. Lewis would rather get labor from the enemy than from non-union classes. The fact that he specified it may be explained by the assertion that contractors were timid about taking the job for fear of Lewis-Green labor troubles on it.
 After all this has been explained, however, there will still remain the fact that Mr. Lewis has not kicked out Mr. Green and vice versa.
 It seems the United Mine Workers' executive committee discovered it did not have the power to expel Mr. Green because he appealed to a local union for a hearing of the charges. His local is at Coshocton, Ohio, and after the matter went there, no one around here heard of it thereafter. Incidentally, there seems to be a deep inside disposition

POLICE REPULSE DEMONSTRATION AT ALIQUIPPA, PA.

Union Leaders Charge Officers Acted Without Provocation — 27,000 Men Idle in Two Big Plants

CLEVELAND, May 13.—(AP)—General Motors' Fisher Body plant here was shut down today by a sit-down strike affecting between 6000 and 7000 employees. Louis Spisak, president of the Fisher body local of the United Auto Workers of America, said the strike was called to protest layoffs and what he called "speed-up."

JANESVILLE, Wis., May 13.—(AP)—The Fisher body and Chevrolet assembly plants of the General Motors corporation, employing 27000 men, remained closed today after a dispute over the status of 14 non-union workers in the Fisher factory.

PITTSBURGH, May 13.—(AP)—Police hurled tear gas into a crowd of shouting, demonstrating pickets today at the strike-closed Alliquippa, Pa., plant of the Jones & Laughlin Steel corporation.

One man was injured in what police Chief W. L. Ambrose said was an attempt to prevent him and Burgess Morgan Sohn from leaving plant property after making an investigation of reported violence.

The chief said he arrested a woman on a charge of assault and battery and inciting to riot.
 Union representatives said 500 pickets were massed at the south gate to the plant when steel-helmeted police threw tear gas cartridges.

Pickets Retreat.
 The union men charged the police attacked without provocation. Pickets boomed as reserve police arrived. Clouds of tear gas rose as a dozen cartridges struck the pavement. The pickets retreated and the police drove off in their cars.

The strike, called after the union and the corporation failed to reach a collective bargaining agreement, threatened to spread to other major independent steel producers.
 It was the nation's first major steel walkout in 18 years.

While 27,000 workers of the two big J. & L. plants in Aliquippa and Pittsburgh remained idle, Chairman Philip Murray of the steel workers' organizing committee called an executive committee session to mobilize union forces against two producers who have refused to sign collective bargaining contracts with the union.
 Murray charged the companies—

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GERMAN AIR RAIDER CAPTURED AT BILBAO

(By the Associated Press)
 The Basque general staff defending Bilbao announced today its troops had shot down a 23-year-old German pilot who admitted he helped bomb Guernica, the sacred city of the Basques, in an air raid April 26 which allegedly devastated the city and killed 800 persons.
 The pilot, whose name was given as Joachim Hans Wandel, was quoted by Basque officers as saying he was recruited in Berlin on February 22, after the international ban on foreign volunteers, to which Germany subscribed, had gone into effect.

Insurgent fliers rained bombs on the town of Munguia, seven miles north of Bilbao, today and General Francisco Franco's attacking army pressed closer to the Basque capital in fierce fighting.

Slur On Hurley Causes Son To Leave Harvard

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 13.—(AP)—A "slur" former Governor James N. Curley said a professor cast upon his reputation cost Harvard law school a student today. Curley's son, Leo Francis Curley.
 "The former governor thrice mayor of Boston, explained his son resigned after the incident "and I advised him to do so."
 Curley said the "slur" occurred during a class discussion of a former mid-western mayor. He said the professor, unnamed, told his class that the mayor in question was corrupt but nevertheless the people kept electing him.
 "He went on to say in much the same fashion the people would elect Curley mayor of Boston next November."

 At the same time it was indicated by Walter H. Leverette, Trevorrow's associate here, that tentative plans are being drawn up for improving the property with a modern building.
 It was also indicated that Trevorrow is considering improvement of the property he owns diagonally across the street, which is now utilized as a Groceria parking lot. Leverette emphasized, however, that the improvement plans are only tentative.

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TRAVEL OR JAIL OPTION OF RISER

Loren Rudolph Riser of Gold Hill faces arrest on a bench warrant under a suspended sentence in circuit court, unless he complies with his promise to return to his home in Nevada, the district attorney reported today. Riser was originally charged with larceny in a dwelling, and leniency was granted when he agreed to return with his wife and children to Nevada.
 Deputy District Attorney George W. Nelson said he had personally purchased Riser a full tank of gasoline and oil, and relief agencies advanced him \$25 for groceries en route to his former home. Instead of going to Nevada Riser returned to Gold Hill.
 Riser and family arrived in this county six months or so ago, by auto. Riser is now on relief.
 The district attorney said he would request the court to revoke the suspended sentence.

HOUSE COMMITTEE FAVORS HUGE SUM FOR WORK RELIEF

\$500,000,000 Added to Billion Is Recommended by Sub-Committee—Hopkins Tells of Relief Program

WASHINGTON, May 13.—(AP)—The house appropriations committee over-rode economy demands today and recommended a \$1,500,000,000 appropriation for work-relief in the fiscal year beginning July 1.
 The committee reversed a subcommittee which voted, 5 to 4, two days ago to hold the appropriation to \$1,000,000,000—one-third less than President Roosevelt asked.

In the opposite wing of the capitol, the senate approved a \$60,000,000 cut in a proposed \$500,000,000 appropriation for soil conservation payments during the next fiscal year.

No Debate on Slash
 The slash made by the appropriations committee was approved without debate, and without vocal dissent, during consideration of the agricultural supply bill. Some of the senate apparently did not even realize the amendment they were approving.
 Immediately after the senate acted, however, Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich) discussed the soil conservation payments, announcing he favored the reduction.

Harry L. Hopkins, works progress administrator, had testified before the house subcommittee the \$1,500,000,000 appropriation would provide jobs for an average of 1,750,000 workers throughout the next fiscal year. That would necessitate, he added, dropping 925,000 persons now working for WPA.

Private Industry Basis
 He made it plain the entire program was contingent on private industry's being able to absorb the displaced WPA workers as well as "millions unemployed who are not under

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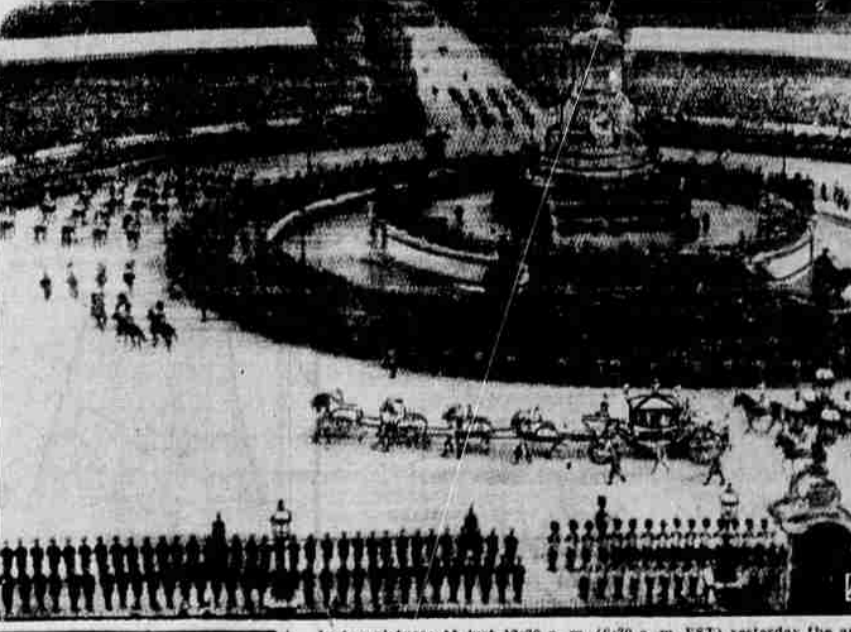
BRITISH WARSHIP DISABLED BY MINE

LONDON, May 13.—(AP)—Three British sailors were killed and 12 injured, Gibraltar naval authorities reported tonight, when the destroyer Hunter presumably struck a mine off the southern Spanish coast near Almeria.
 The Hunter was on patrol duty for the European non-intervention committee seeking to prevent influx of arms to Spain. The Spanish government destroyer Lazaga towed the British ship into Almeria.
 Cause of the explosion was unknown.
 It was understood the destroyers Hardy and Hyperion were proceeding to the vicinity to stand by.

BRITISH LEADERS PLAN SOFT PEDAL FOR WINDSOR DUKE

Would Forget Memory of George's 'Older Brother' and Place Heavy Stress Upon Memory of Father

(By the Associated Press.)
 LONDON, May 13.—(AP)—British government officials and the press embarked today on a sturdy effort to forget King George's "older brother" and stress the memory of his father in a crescendo of post-coronation exultation.
 With column after column printed about the King and the designation, "older brother," adopted by the newspapers for the Duke of Windsor, there were revived reports George VI, now that he has time, will grow a beard to look more like George V.
 The king and smiling Queen Elizabeth, meantime, toured north London streets in a surprise drive that brought thousands of delighted residents surging about their car.

Silent On Wedding
 Newspapers said nothing about the apparent efforts of government and royal family to break a deadlock over the recognition of the Duke of Windsor's June marriage to Wallis Warfield.

Instead, British efforts were bent to highlight the parallels between George VI, newly crowned, and the late George V.
 Aside from rumors of an intended beard for the king, many radio listeners who heard George VI last night, remarked upon the strong resemblance in the voice and language of father and son.

Empire statesmen turned from the medieval pageant of coronation to face the modern realities of the commonwealth's most pressing problems. Prime ministers and representatives of the dominions and of India, having paid their tributes to their monarch and his Queen, Elizabeth, awaited the call of Prime Minister

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DUKE AND GOVERNMENT SQUABBLE OVER TITLE TO BE ACCORDED BRIDE

LONDON, May 13.—(AP)—The Duke of Windsor's pre-nuptial struggle with the British government, authoritative sources disclosed today, is for recognition of Mrs. Wallis Warfield, his bride-to-be, as "her royal highness, the Duchess of Windsor."
 The duke, it was learned, will not even be content to have Mrs. Warfield become "the Duchess of Windsor."

So heated has the dispute between the former monarch and the government become that Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin's cabinet today reviewed the whole question.
 Having yielded to Windsor's demands that Mrs. Warfield become a duchess, the ministers stood pat against allowing her to be addressed, "her royal highness." It was reported.

A source close to the government disclosed negotiations have been going on for some time in an effort to bring a compromise. But Windsor, they said, is insistent his bride be called "her royal highness;" the government that she not be so titled.
 Why Windsor is so determined his future duchess be a "royal highness" is not known.

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MERRILL IN AIR ON RETURN HOP

LONDON, May 13.—(AP)—Dick Merrill, American aviator, took off from Southampton at 9:15 p. m. (4-18 p. m. E.S.T.) today on a return transatlantic hop to the United States, the Exchange Telegraph Agency said.
 Merrill with Co-Pilot Jack Lambie flew here from Floyd Bennett field, New York, Monday to pick up pictures of the coronation of King George VI.
 He had left New York last Sunday and made the eastward crossing in 20 hours and 59 minutes, that trip being his third crossing of the Atlantic within a year.
