Artificial Aids

By a little advance thought, it's easy for a girl to look her best for the camera. Remember:

Don't—reveal heavy or skinny shoulders by an evening gown with straps.
Do—wear a coat if it has a smart fur collar and neckline; or a dark blue dress if the eyes are light blue, to bring out their color.

Coat of Tan Helps

Don't—have a hair wave later than a day before the sitting. Sleep on it overnight, then comb it out softly.

Do—Apply lipstick so that thick lips are reduced, thin lips are more full.

Don't—end the eyebrow line abruptly, but pencil it barely heavier than natural color to a soft ending.

Do—Have a trace of tan. White skin "washes out" under artificial light.

Above all, said Jones, don't worry. If your face freezes with nervousness, shut your eyes and moisten your lips. The picture should be snapped the instant you open your eyes. Jones learned that trick when he started in business in his home town, Superior, Wis.

FISHING REMAINS POOR IN STREAMS; LAKES BEST BET

The following bulletin was issued today by Rogue River national forest headquarters:

"Heavy rains followed by warm weather have caused all of the streams in the upper Rogue district to rise somewhat during the past week.

"Rogue river from McLeod to Trail is murky and trout fishing is reported as fair. Elk creek is high, not very clear and affords poor fishing. Streams are fairly clear in the vicinity of Union Creek and several catches of trout have been made with salmon eggs at the Copco dam west of Prospect is reported as fair. The road from Prospect to the middle fork of Rogue river is open and some good catches have been made in these streams with bait.

"In the vicinity of Butte Falls, Big Butte creek has been yielding good catches for fly-fishermen using royal coachman and gray hackle, although the water is still somewhat high for best fly-fishing. Several good catches of trout have been made in Fourbit creek with bait. The road to south fork of Rogue river via Butte Falls remains closed.

"Good fishing is reported at Squaw lake in the Applegate district. Several catches of good-sized cutthroat trout have been made by using the troll with tandem and night-crawlers. No boats are available at either lake. The road is in good condition. The Applegate and its tributaries generally are too high for good fishing, although some fair catches have been taken in Carberry and middle fork.

"Fishing at Fish lake remains excellent. The road is rough but passable. The best catches of eastern brook and silverides have been made by still-fishing. Boats, supplies, cabins and tree campgrounds are available. The road has been opened to Lake of the Woods and on over the mountain to Rocky Point. No reports have been received as to fishing conditions at either Lake of the Woods or Klamath lake.

"There will be no resort accommodations at Lake of the Woods this week-end, but it is expected that the resort will be open the following week. The road to Hiatt lake is open and in fair condition for travel. No reports have been received on fishing conditions there.

"Reports have been received that salmon were striking well again at Hilton yesterday. No reports were received from other points along the river.

"Wild flowers are at their best now in the lower elevations. Fields of lambtonques, wild orchid and buttercups can be seen. Other flowers out are dogwood, wild currant, service-berry, red bells, birdbills and baby-blue-eyes."
