

Steels and Rails Lead Rally in Stocks on News of Strike Settlement

TRADING CIRCLES EXERCISE CAUTION IN COMMITMENTS

Upturn Attributed to View Technical Rally in Cards After Thursday's Sharp Decline in Stock Values

NEW YORK, May 14.—(AP)—With steels and rails in front, yesterday's skidding stocks righted themselves in today's market with recoveries of fractions to 3 or more points.

Partly inspiring the relatively quiet turn-about was the tentative settlement of the Jones & Laughlin steel strike putting some 27,000 men back to work pending an employee election to determine whether the C. I. O. union shall be granted bargaining rights under the national labor relations act.

Even with the improved news from the labor front, trading circles proceeded carefully in buying commitments as it was realized unionization drives against more steel independents are probable in addition to workers' disputes in other industries.

Brokers attributed much of the day's betterment to purchases by those who believed at least a technical rally was in the cards because of Thursday's sharp decline. Profits were reduced, top quotations in some instances before the close.

Transfers approximated 1,200,000 shares.
