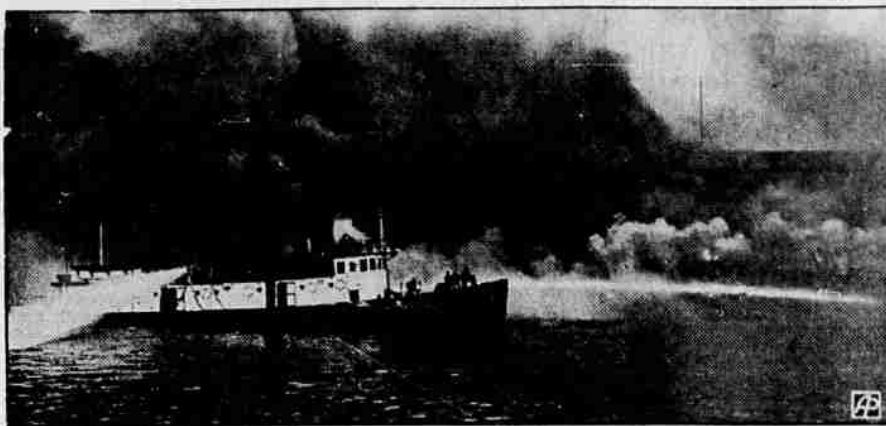


GOVERNOR AGAINST STATE RECOGNIZING EMPLOYES' UNION

and by the constitution of the state itself. No group can threaten or forcefully interfere with operation of the state government unless it is willing to assume responsibility of a

revolution. The state cannot, and will not, idly permit such a situation because it is charged with the duty of maintaining itself for the good of all the people instead of for the benefit of organized minorities.
"Attention must be called to the fact that title 29, section 152, subdivision 2, of the national labor relations act, so-called Wagner act, states:
"The term employer shall include any person acting in the interest of an employer, directly or indirectly, but shall not include the United States, or any state or political subdivision thereof."
State Exempt.
"In this wording the act clearly recognizes the sovereign character of the states and definitely exempts

from provisions of the state and its duly constituted officers.
"Chief Justice Hughes and Justice McReynolds of the United States supreme court commented on this fact in recent majority and minority decisions handed down by each respectively relative to the constitutionality of the national labor relations act.
"The right of public employees to threaten sovereignty of a state by strikes was disposed of in the Boston police strike.
"The state cannot and will not enter into bargaining with labor union organizations or their representatives regarding state employees, for the simple reason that because public money is used for payment of services of employees it is mandatory that no person be discriminated against for not belonging to a union, nor given preference because of membership.
"Exemption of the state from provisions of the national labor relations act also prevents employees from having recourse to the labor relations board in the matter of filing charges or complaints against the state for any purpose whatever.
"In short, the only privilege accorded state employees in joining a union organization will be that of paying dues and enjoying whatever fraternal satisfaction arises therefrom."
When asked what he meant by "subversive organizations," mentioned in the second paragraph of his statement, Governor Martin declined to mention any by name.

SURPLUS POTATOES TURNED BY IRELAND INTO FUEL ALCOHOL

DUBLIN.—(UP)—The potato is once again likely to become Ireland's most important product.
This is due to the establishment of industrial alcohol factories.
In these factories surplus potatoes and beets will be converted into alcohol which will be used for heating, lighting various scientific purposes.
The potatoes are washed when they reach the distillery. They are then conveyed to a converter, where they are crushed and steamed under pressure. When this process is completed, they are transferred to the mash tun, where they are stirred up vigorously.
Not more than 3 percent of malt is added to the potatoes in the mash tun. The action of the malt saccharifies or converts the potato starch into sugar.
When the mash has cooled, the liquor or wort is drawn off into wash backs. The residue forms a valuable food for stock, and is extensively used for feeding cattle and pigs.
The wort is then treated with yeast. This induces fermentation and when the process is completed, the wort becomes wash. The wash contains alcohol, and it is ready for distillation.
Potatoes produce 26 gallons of alcohol a ton, and dried potatoes will yield 83 gallons a ton. Barley produces 72 gallons of alcohol a ton.

"A 2-2-50 Bordeaux spray at this time will be effective in cutting down the damage done by this disease. There is some danger of burn by the use of this spray alone and so it is advised that one pint of fish oil or mineral oil of the summer type be added to each 100 gallons. This has appreciably reduced the foliage injury," Cordy said.

PORTLAND, May 14.—(AP)—Thy Lawrence Schochert will always have a special reason to commemorate the anniversary of King George's coronation. A doctor listened to a broadcast of the London ceremonies and officiated at Lawrence's birth at the same time. He delivered the infant the same moment the crown was placed on the monarch's head.

Non-Swim Duck Dubbed "Marine"

ASTORIA, May 14.—(AP)—Of all the ducks in the world, you may never find another like the one possessed by sailors at the Young's Bay naval radio station.
The navy men tamed, fed and

reared a wild duck. But when they tested its sea-going wefeet, they had to rescue it. The duck simply couldn't swim.
Other swimming experiments failed, so the boys gave up in disgust. They found a dry spot for the bird and named it Marine.
