

DAZZLING STUNTS TO BE PERFORMED AT AIR SHOW HERE

Famed Dare-Devs Sign Options to Take Part in State Carnival - Giant Planes to Make Landing

Options have been procured on the services of the country's most outstanding stunt pilots for the Oregon arial tour to start here on July 1. It was announced today by Max Peirce, head of the Oregon Aviation Development Committee, Inc., which has charge of the air circus.

The options, Mr. Peirce said, were obtained in Los Angeles by Allan D. Greenwood, inspector of the Oregon state board of aeronautics which is co-operating with the ten cities staging the show.

The pilots signing the options include Tex Rankin, former chairman of the Oregon aeronautics board, Frank Clark, who was here last year to perform stunts for a motion picture, Paul Mantz, who flew recently

to Honolulu with Amelia Earhart, Bernadine King, women's champion, upside-down flier, Al Lary, George Cook, "Iron-Hat" Johnson and several others.

To Make Choice
The Oregon Aviation Development Committee will meet in Bend May 23 to choose the stunt pilots for the arial tour, Mr. Peirce said.

Medford chapter of the National Aeronautic association, local sponsor, will meet at 7:30 next Wednesday night in the Jackson county Chamber of Commerce to make detailed arrangements for the show here, it was stated by Mr. Peirce, chapter president.

"It is our aim to stage the greatest and most dazzling air show Medford has ever seen," Mr. Peirce said.

Big Ships to Land
Participants in the state air carnival are to gather here on July 1 and put on the show at the municipal air port the following day.

An added attraction of the show will be the arrival of two of the huge Douglas planes now operating on the United Air Lines coast service. One plane will be northbound, the other southbound on regular passenger-mail schedules and a 15-minute stop will be made at the airport to give the public here its first close-up glimpse of the giant airliners, Mr. Peirce pointed out.

WPA INAUGURATES RELIEF ROLL CUTS TO CONSERVE COIN

State Directors Instructed to Make Communities Meet Larger Portion of Cost of Materials Utilized

WASHINGTON, May 14.—(AP)—The works progress administration today announced that it is instructing state directors to make communities meet a larger portion of the cost of materials used on relief projects.

Some more prosperous communities now are paying for all supplies used on their projects, and the proportion of non-labor costs met by other communities is being adjusted to their ability to pay.

The question of how the government should spend for relief in the year beginning July 1 is now before congress.

Rep. Woodrum (D-Va.), an economy advocate, has proposed that \$1,000,000,000 be allotted, but the house appropriations committee voted yesterday to seek an additional \$900,000,000. President Roosevelt estimated the larger amount would be needed.

Harry L. Hopkins, works progress administrator, told a subcommittee that the administration's program for dropping 625,000 persons from WPA rolls would be successful only if private industry could hire those displaced from government projects.

He said the WPA lay-offs would occur, however, only "if business conditions improve sufficiently." An average of 1,700,000 persons could be given jobs throughout the year under the administration program.

The WPA reported today that "all but 3.7 per cent of the employees on the works progress administration rolls as of April 24 were persons certified as in need of relief."

The 10 per cent limit for non-relief employment, it said, never was approached in actual practice.

INFLATION DANGER OVER FOR PRESENT

WASHINGTON, May 14.—(AP)—A federal financial authority declared today official fears of inflation have subsided—at least for the time being.

The official, who declined to be quoted by name, cited three major reasons for his belief that warnings against the danger of a too rapid spiral of prices had taken effect:

1. Prices of many articles which were climbing rapidly two months ago have leveled off recently. The labor department's index of wholesale commodity prices dropped a little each week in April, receding from 88.3 to 87.5.
2. Congressmen are showing intense interest in the problems of balancing the budget. Strong "economy blocks" in both houses are seeking to hold down expenditures for the coming year.
3. Government officials have shown renewed interest in the problem of curbing monopolies in business. The justice department has challenged the Aluminum Company of America under the anti-trust laws and Attorney General Cummings has recommended revision of these statutes.

HIT FLOATING MINE IS OFFICIAL FINDING

LONDON, May 14.—(AP)—The British admiralty officially announced today eight men were killed aboard the destroyer Hunter yesterday when it was rocked by an explosion just off the government-held city of Almeria on the southern Spanish coast.

Despite the insistence of Spanish government sources at Valencia and Almeria that the blast was caused by an attack from "a German submarine," a floating mine laid during the months old Spanish civil war was understood to have been definitely established as the cause of the disaster.

The official announcement came as the admiralty launched an investigation at Almeria to determine who laid the mine and fix responsibility for what observers believed would be a stern protest.

Twenty other members of the crew of the warship were injured, some of them seriously, by the shattering explosion which ripped open the Hunter's bows in mid-afternoon.

Dispatches from Gibraltar said the destroyer, one of Britain's newest men-of-war, was on duty as a unit of the international "hands off Spain" patrol when she struck the floating mine about four miles off the southeastern corner of Spain where it juts out into the Mediterranean.

RETAIL TRADING HOLDS UP-GRADE

NEW YORK, May 14.—(AP)—General trade moved forward toward its spring peak during the past week as demand for all types of merchandise was the most insistent since March.

Dun & Bradstreet, Inc. reported in its weekly review of business. Retail distribution, which is expected to reach its crest in June, was active in virtually all quarters and production schedules were maintained at a high rate, although operations were not stepped up noticeably in many lines, the survey disclosed. Gains in retail business ranged from 5 to 10 percent ahead of the previous week and were 10 to 22 percent more than the comparative 1936 total. None of the key cities reporting showed a decline.

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DORE CRITICIZES BRIDGES' TACTICS

SAN FRANCISCO, May 14.—(AP)—Mayor John P. Dore of Seattle, Wash., last night censured the tactics of Harry Bridges and his International Longshoremen's association in their fight with the teamsters' union for control of inland warehouses.

Dore, professed champion of labor, made his remarks after reading reports from Seattle that he had been hooded and jeered at an I.L.A. mass meeting in Seattle Wednesday.

Dore had been asked to address the mass meeting, but sent a letter in which he said:

"After careful consideration I am convinced that in the interest of organized labor in Seattle I should decline your invitation."

The Seattle mayor said he knew he would "get that kind of reception" when he wrote the letter.

G. P. HOSPITAL PATIENT ROBBED BY BOY WORKER

GRANTS PASS, May 14.—(AP)—A 15-year-old boy, hospital employee, pleaded guilty in circuit court today to larceny of \$80 from the person of Max Elmer White, brought fatally injured to the hospital last Saturday night.

Friends told officers here that White, who died a few hours later, was accustomed to carrying large sums of money pinned to his clothing.

Judge H. D. Norton suspended passing of sentence on report that the boy is a hard worker and that he has opportunity for employment outside the city. He has previously appeared in juvenile court and been paroled.
