Referendum petitions, numbering 27, upon two measures passed by the last legislature covering "slot machine seizures by the sheriff, and destruction by court order," and prohibiting slot machines, dart games, and similar devices," have been filed with the county clerk for checking with the registration books.

The petitions were circulated in all incorporated towns and cities of Jackson county. Some were aparently signed, others heavily. Signatures are still being sought. The petitions must be filed and checked before Monday, June 7.
