

MEMORIAL RITES ARE OUTLINED AT LEGION MEETING

Plans for the annual observance of Memorial Day were discussed at Tuesday night's meeting of the American Legion held in the new quarters at the Armory. A report by Col. W. H. Payne, chairman of the Legion committee revealed that the usual patriotic parade will move from the city park at 9:30 a. m. Monday, May 31 followed by exercises at the Bear Creek bridge after which a program will be given at the park, weather permitting, or at the Presbyterian church in case of rain.

All patriotic organizations in Medford will cooperate in putting on the day's observance according to Col. Payne.

Local Legion officials urge all business houses and local residents to display the national colors as a tribute to the departed heroes of all wars. A new supply of the regulation street flag has been secured by Medford post and can be obtained from Adjutant Lee Garlock at the AAA office on North Riverside.

Post Commander Pfeigl announced that the annual Memorial Day church services will be held at St. Mark's Episcopal church Sunday, May 30 and all Legion and Auxiliary members are urged to plan now to attend.

Nomination of officers for the ensuing year will be held at the next two regular meetings with the annual election slated for the first meeting in July. Special entertainments programs are planned for each of these three meetings and Post Commander

METERS FORESEEN UNLESS WASTE OF WATER IS ENDED

Board of water commissioners today warned that unless the usual waste of water is avoided this summer, service by meter impends. City homes are now charged a flat rate for their water.

A statement issued by the board said "the negligent wasting of water is not only a disgrace, but this abuse is hastening the time when the town will be metered because of the tremendous load it places on the system."

The board also pointed out that the use of an open hose without nozzle is forbidden because it cuts down the pressure in the immediate area. "In other words," the statement said, "the neighbors of the person using the open hose is penalized."

Residents were reminded also that water taps and faucets must be shut off when the fire alarm is sounded. Pressure drops in summer months when water is used generously in sprinkling lawns and gardens, it was pointed out.

"The fire department must have the maximum water pressure available during a fire to protect the property of citizens," the board said. "In the event of a large fire in some of the outlying parts of the city it would be impossible to combat the blaze successfully unless water users all over the city responded to this rule of shutting off their water when the fire alarm is first sounded and leaving it off until the 'fire-out' signal is blown."

These few rules are simple and absolutely necessary, the board declared in making a plea for public cooperation.

CANYONVILLE FATHER REQUESTS NO JURY IN CHILD BEATING TRIAL

ROSEBURG, Ore., May 21.—(P)—Leonard Hopkins, Canyonville barber, indicted by the grand jury on a charge of assault and battery, has filed in circuit court a formal election to have his case tried without a jury. It is the first time that such election has been made in a criminal case in Douglas county.

The charge against Hopkins grew out of the death of his four-year-old daughter, Barbara Irene, April 17. The step-mother, Cordella Hopkins, has entered a plea of guilty to a charge of involuntary manslaughter, admitting in a confession placed before Judge Carl Wimberly, striking the child over the head with the handle of a table knife. The injuries, physicians reported, caused a hemorrhage which resulted in death. She is awaiting sentence.

Hopkins is accused in the indictment of brutally beating the child prior to her death.

His attorney, Ray B. Compton, in the formal notice of election filed with Judge Wimberly, states that the public mind "has been inflamed by rumors and publicity," and that it would be difficult to secure an unprejudiced jury. The trial could best be held, it was contended before a "judge skilled in weighing law and facts."

J. V. Long, district attorney, said today that the Hopkins case has resulted in a flood of letters, many of them bearing anonymous signatures, urging the most vigorous prosecution. Nearly all of the letters, he said, are apparently from women, principally mothers, and come not only from Oregon but neighboring states as well.

Assistant Forester Of Siskiyou Resigns

ORANTZ PASS, May 21.—(AP)—C. C. Olsen, assistant forester of the Siskiyou national forest, today announced his resignation.

Save for "doing some fishing," he said, his plans are indefinite. He came here March 27, 1935, from the Willamette forest at Eugene.

'RED ARMY' TO ATTACK EUGENE EARLY SUNDAY IN OFFICERS MEETING

EUGENE, May 21.—(AP)—The "Red Army of Roseburg," due to arrive in the vicinity of Coos Bay, will attack the city of Eugene Sunday morning—but the "Blue Army of Eugene" is prepared and waiting to defend its city. The battle will start at 9:30 a. m. Sunday. War was declared a month ago, and the "Red" forces, advancing from the south, are pushing rapidly towards this university city.

This warlike statement was made here by officers of the army reserve stationed here, but it merely concerns activities of a contact "camp" which will be held here over the week-end by district reserve officers. Among the many things on the program from the week-end will be a "battle" Sunday morning, during which various methods of communication from ground to air and air to ground will be tested.

The "Red Army's" attack will be featured by use of numerous aircraft, with 14 planes scheduled to arrive here from Boeing field, Seattle, Pearson field, Vancouver, Wash., and Felix field, Spokane. First of these ships is expected Saturday morning.

Other important events on the two-day program include a banquet Saturday night, a smoker, and special church services Sunday. Well over 150 officers are expected for the "camp," with representatives scheduled to come from Salem, Portland, Corvallis, Medford, Bend, Gibbon, Seattle, Pendleton, Klamath Falls, Marshfield and Roseburg.

ROME, May 21.—(AP)—Former King Alfonso of Spain was reported reliably today to have split with his oldest son, the Count of Covadonga, because he heard that the count has retracted his renunciation of claims to the Spanish succession and has announced his intention of marrying again.

Count Covadonga was divorced this month from Eleonora Sampedro, the Cuban commoner for whom he forfeited his royal rights.
