MUNGO, BROOKLYN MOUND ACE, FINED FOR DRUNKEN ROW

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 22.—(UP)—VanLingle Mungo, ace pitcher for the Brooklyn Dodgers, nursed a black eye and a throbbing head in his room at the Hotel Chase here tonight, but nevertheless cheerfully described his side of a scrap with Jimmy Bucher, utility infielder, in which chairs and mirrors were broken and walls damaged.

It was, he said, "a little misunderstanding."

The "little misunderstanding" resulted in a fine of \$1,000 and a three-day suspension, imposed by General Manager John Gorman of the Dodgers, after a conference with club officials in Brooklyn.

Gorman said the pitcher committed a breach of discipline by "getting drunk and fighting."

The "misunderstanding" started when Mungo entered an apartment occupied by Woody English and Jimmy Bucher.

"I just went down to talk to Jimmy," Mungo said. "There was nothing to it. We just had a little misunderstanding, and he was awing at me."

"Did you swing back?"

"Sure," said Mungo. "It wouldn't have been a fight if I didn't. That's how fights usually start."

Weights of the fighters: Mungo, 210, 6 feet 2 inches tall; Bucher, 150, 5 feet 7 inches tall.

In addition to the fine, suspension and black eye, Mungo must account to the management of the Chase hotel for mirrors, chairs and other items of wrecked furniture.

Bucher played third base in today's game with the St. Louis Cardinals, apparently none the worse for the encounter. The utility infielder said the \$1,000 fine and suspension should take care of Mungo. He refused further comment.

Mystery Ill Hits Million Trout Fry

BEND, May 22.—(AP)—Fingerlings in the Fall river fish hatchery continued today to die by the thousands from a mysterious plague, the identity of which so far has baffled experts.

Matt L. Ryckman, superintendent of state fisheries, said some 3,000,000 eastern brook trout fingerlings have died from a malady which gives some evidence of gill fungus. Other causes may be parasites, food or water poisoning, said Ryckman.

An expert from Oregon State college arrived at the hatchery to aid state officials in studying the disease.

The hatchery is located on a short tributary of the Deschutes river south of here.
