

PORTLAND LABOR FACTIONS CLASH; COPS HALT RIOT

Five Hundred Workers Go On Sympathy Strike — Bridges Group Stages Demonstration.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 24.—(AP)—A jurisdictional dispute with the fight between the Committee for Industrial Organization and the American Federation of Labor as a background flamed higher today as police clashed with demonstrators and 500 men walked out of bag plants and flouring mills, apparently in a sympathy strike.

Several hundred men, massing before the delivery depot of the big Meier & Frank Department store, battleground of the inter-labor dispute, were dispersed by police, who arrested six men on charges of inciting riot, and battered the head of one of them.

While a squad of 55 officers restored order at the depot, operators of the bag plants and flouring mills found their factories silent with notices posted on their doors that "an emergency exists."

Presumably the emergency was the attempt of the International Longshoremen's association warehouse union to call a strike among warehousemen of Meier & Frank in opposition to the teamsters' union, which claims jurisdiction over the warehousemen. Last week William Green, president of the A. F. of L., called upon the Central Labor Council here to oust the I. L. A. group unless it quit its efforts to organize the warehousemen under plans of Harry Bridges, Pacific coast maritime labor leader, to extend the power of the I. L. A. inland from the waterfront. The council voices on the issue tonight.

FIELDS CASE SET FOR TRIAL JUNE 7

Trial of William J. Fields on a second degree murder charge has been set tentatively for June 7 in circuit court here.

Fields, 62 years old, is charged with slaying M. M. Mow, 40, of Ashland in the Jacksonville home of the former's estranged wife. Fields has been in Jackson county jail since the fatal shooting February 6. He and Mow had trouble over Mow's asserted attention to Mrs. Fields.

Ashland Amusement Firm Incorporated

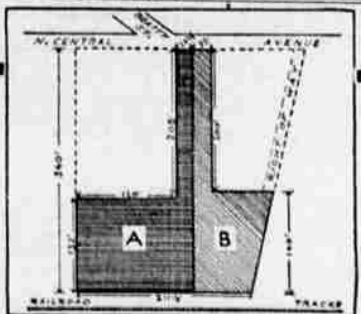

PORTABLE HOUSE FOR TUBERCULARS READY IN MONTH

First of the portable tuberculosis cottages being built for use by the Jackson county health department is nearing completion and is expected to be ready for use in about a month, Dr. G. L. Drummond, county physician, reports.

Manual training classes of the senior high school, under the direction of Leland Mentzer, are constructing the building and donating labor. The project is being sponsored by the Jackson county health association which has provided a large proportion of necessary funds.

The cottages, constructed on skids so that they may be easily moved, are to be one-room wooden frame structures with windows on three sides. Furniture includes a bed, stand, chair and stove.

Health authorities believe that such cottages will facilitate the fight against the spread of infection. They will enable patients to remain close to their families without actual contact which frequently leads to infection of other members of the family, Dr. Drummond pointed out. The project was also designed to aid those patients who are unable to afford a stay in a sanitarium or who would have to wait several months to be admitted to the state hospital.

Although the cottages will be used repeatedly, they will be entirely refurnished inside for each new patient. Two more cottages are planned for construction within the next few months by WPA funds. The project has been approved locally and by the state WPA office and is now awaiting final approval from Washington, D. C.

Average cost of the buildings is estimated at about \$250. Construction materials run close to \$150 without furnishings. The beds alone cost \$60.

SPOKANE, Wash., May 24.—(AP)—A bride of 24 hours, Mrs. Walter Crank of Medford, Ore., looked forward today to leaving a Spokane hospital so she can have a honeymoon trip home.

Her doctors said her broken back would be sufficiently healed within a week to permit her to go by automobile to Medford with her husband, a hosiery salesman at Medford and an ordained but non-practicing minister.

Lying in a rigid cast and holding a large bouquet of flowers as she lay flat on her back, the former Mrs. Ruth Holmes became a bride in her hospital room, her friends from Oregon and nurses witnessing the ceremony, performed by the Rev. H. A. Van Winkle of Spokane.

She was injured in an automobile accident here a year ago, and went to the hospital for several months. When her back failed to heal, she returned her from Medford for a delicate operation.

Before the ceremony, she said she wanted to be married in the hospital because "I have always wanted to do something different."

HAAB ENDEAVORS TO SAW WAY OUT OF COUNTY JAIL

Failing in his third attempt to escape, Elmer Haab was being held in solitary confinement in the Jackson county jail today pending his removal to the state penitentiary at Salem where he is to serve a five-year term. He will be taken to Salem this week, possibly tomorrow, Sheriff Syd Brown said.

Haab, Ashland youth, tried to saw his way to liberty Saturday afternoon, using hack saw blades he had concealed in his necktie. He had sawed away two bars of his cell when he was discovered by E. L. Clow, jailer. It would have been necessary to cut away two additional bars before he could emerge from his cell and then he would be faced by the several other walls of steel bars through which his saw could not cut, Sheriff Brown said.

Haab, who is 19, made his first jail escape a short time ago when he had only 15 days left to serve. He was then a trusty. Captured, he was sentenced to prison for three years on a burglary charge. On his way from court to the jail, he escaped again.

Haab was recaptured in a night resort when he attempted to telephone to another jail inmate about hack saw blades he had tossed on the top of the jail. He was then sentenced to two years more for escape while under conviction.

While he was at liberty Haab snatched Robert Parker, another youth, to leave an Eagle Point home to which he had been paroled after a robbery. Parker was still at liberty today.

REAL LIFE TESTS TOLD GRADUATES BY REV. GIBSON

Graduates of Medford high school were advised last night to be ready to meet "The Tests of Real Life" by Rev. Oscar G. Gibson, who delivered the sermon at baccalaureate services held at the school.

A large crowd of parents and friends attended the services, exceeding the seating capacity of the large auditorium.

Linking the high school graduate to a hot-house plant suddenly transferred to an outdoor garden, Rev. Gibson named exposure as the first test to be faced. Many, he said, do not successfully survive the first transfer from a comparatively sheltered life to direct contact with real problems.

Many persons, the speaker continued, are unsuccessful in life, not because of lack of ability but because they possess insufficient endurance, which he called the second great test of life.

The test and comparison is a stumbling block for many, Rev. Gibson believes. The common mistake, he said, is to compare accomplishments with those of other persons rather than with the individual's own ideals. The ideals with which one starts out are apt to be submerged, but a constant comparison of one's actual-life and ideals is vital to a successful life, Gibson pointed out.

The fourth and final test is that of sacrifice, Gibson told the students. A willingness to sacrifice is all-important to any worthwhile accomplishment, he advised his listeners. Pointing out that, while Confucius said, "Know Thyself"; Buddha preached "Submerge Thyself"; and Mohammed exhorted his followers to "Assert Thyself," Christ said "Deny Thyself." Denial must be practiced for a full and successful life, Rev. Gibson concluded.
