

### CATHOLIC CLERGY UNDER FIRE NAZI PROPAGANDA HEAD

BERLIN, Germany, May 28.—(AP)—Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels called on the Catholic hierarchy today to cease what he called its "staggering" of Nazi justice under threat of being called into court to testify under oath.

Goebbels, in a speech of an hour and a half which was billed as an "answer" to the critical words of George Cardinal Mundelein in Chicago mentioned the cardinal but once.

Instead he devoted most of his speech to a bitter attack on the Catholic clergy in general. "The cardinal in his Chicago speech called Adolf Hitler an 'Austrian paper hanger' referred to Goebbels as 'crooked' and said the continued 'immorality' trials of Catholics in Germany made wartime atrocity stories look like bed-time tales."

breaking of a barrier between all that lies north of us and all that lies south.

From far out over the Pacific the giant navy planes emerged from cloud banks and flew in formation over the picturesque scene.

Some 202,000 pedestrians crossed the bridge yesterday, and thousands of automobiles were expected to travel over the two-mile span today when President Roosevelt presses the starting button.

From 6 a. m. yesterday until the bridge was closed 12 hours later its great deck was packed with humanity, treading portions which after today will be filled with speeding vehicles.

Once opened to traffic, the structure, with its 4200-foot central span, will be available 24 hours a day, as is the 8 1/2 mile bay bridge to Oakland, opened last November.

While thousands poured across the giant span, San Francisco relaxed generally in the spirit of a fiesta which has put its citizenry in costumes ranging from the garb of 40ers to the quaint native costumes of its many foreign quarters.

Thousands of flags float over streets lined with artificial redwood trees, symbolizing the great northern California area now linked directly by the bridge, which joins San Francisco and Marin counties, formerly reached directly only by ferries.

One tragedy marred the construction. On Feb. 17, this year, a moving scaffold collapsed beneath the

single deck, plunging 10 men to death in the turbulent waters.

### HAAB, JAILBREAK PRISONER, LEAVES FOR PEN SUNDAY

Three inmates of the Jackson county jail will be taken to the state penitentiary in Salem Sunday by Sheriff Syd Brown and Deputy Herb Moore.

The prisoners are Elmer Haab, 19, sentenced to five years, three for burglary and two for escaping after conviction; Arthur W. Rossiter, 19, three years for burglary; and Robert O'Bryan, 33, four years for forgery. Haab is the Ashland youth who escaped from jail when he was a trusty with only 15 days of a 90-day sentence left to serve. After his capture he was sentenced for burglary and escaped again as he was being led back to jail from the court. Recaptured in a night resort he was sentenced to two years more for escaping while under conviction. A third attempt to escape was foiled after he had swayed away two bars of his solitary cell.

Haab was said at first to take his escapades as a lark but the sheriff's office today stated that the seriousness of his plight is beginning to penetrate.
